Heifers not bred sold at \$40 and bob-calves brought \$7 and \$8 a piece. Hay in the mow realized \$10 a ton, buckwheat 67c bushel, and oats 60c. Mr. Pipher is giving up farming and will probably take up factory work. His sale realized more than his highest hopes. A. S. Farmer wielded the auction hammer.

## CHURCH WANTS COMPULSORY MILITARY SERVICE

A demand for immediate adoption by Canada of a compulsory war service plan was made in a resolution passed in the closing hours of the 14th annual convention of the Union of Regular Baptists of Ontario and Quebec, at Jarvis Street Baptist Church, Toronto, The resolution was adopted clause by clause, the entire audience of nearly 2,000 people voicing their approval by applause. Prepared by the resolutions committee, the document will be sent immediately to Right Hon. William L. Mackenzie King, Canada's Prime Minister. The convention theme throughout was "the Menace of Romanism" and the resolution protested against "the principle of minority rule."

In the preamble it was pointed out that it must be recognized by every individual conscience that the present war is an attempt to overthrow civilization, and with it all principles of human rights and obligations involved in liberty in democratic government.

Sorry to report Betty Morris is still unable to attend school owing to sickness.

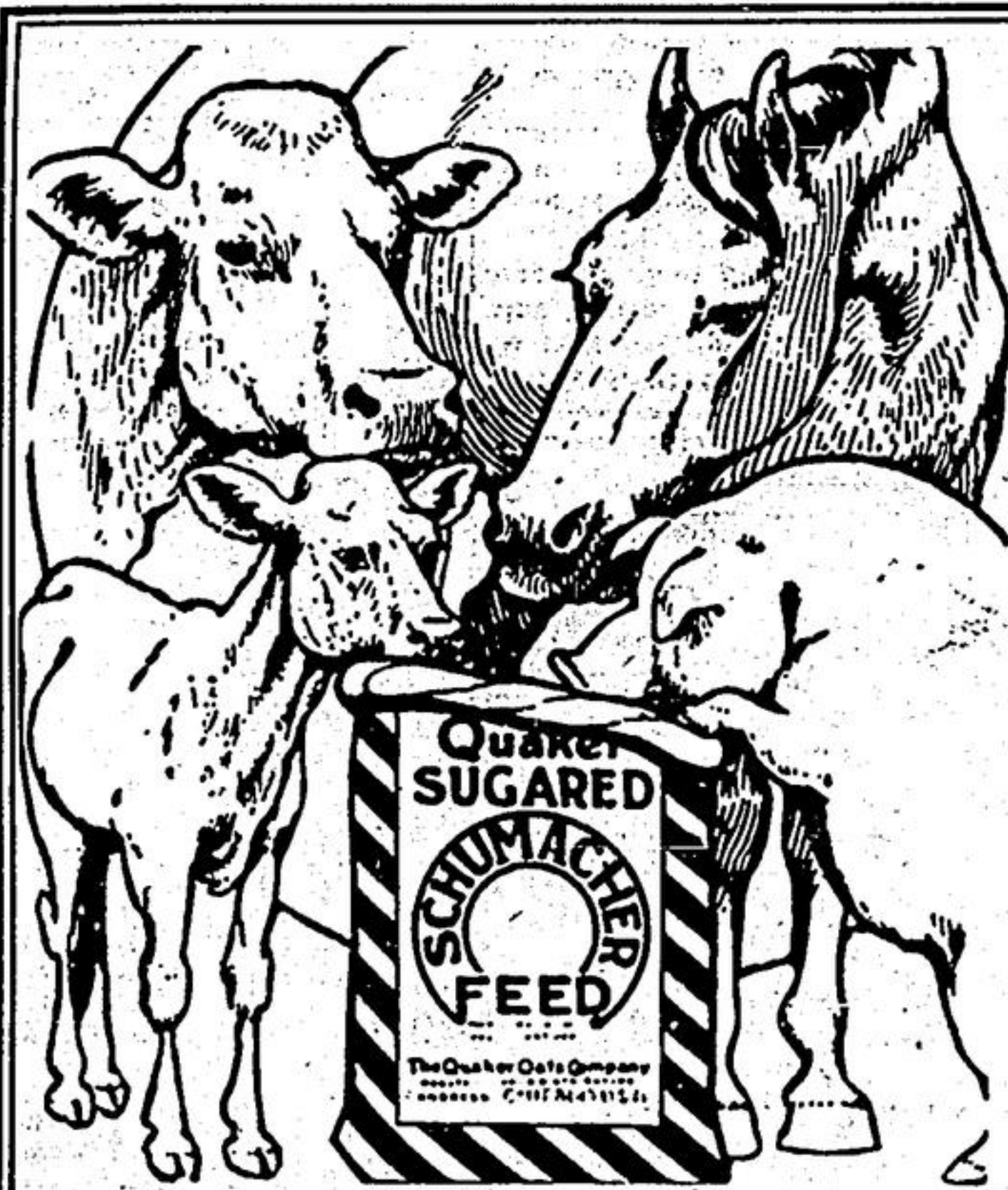
