**MARSH GROWERS HAVE BOOM YEAR**

Crops on the Holland Marsh are nearly all harvested for this year and there is evidence of greater prosperity among the marsh growers than ever before.

Radical changes have been made in the system of holding land and of growing and marketing crops during the past few years. A few years ago

most of the land was owned and crops were managed by a few growers who hired their help. Now practically all the land is worked by the owner, who owns a little plot of about five or ten acres.

As a result of this, expenses are not as high and, if the year is poor, the grower just lives a bit more economically and does not contract heavy debts.

**SYNTHETIC WESTERNER**



Lieut.-Col. R. E. A. Morton, admits having been born and educated in the east, but there's no more fervent westerner in Winnipeg's Fort Garry Horse, which he now commands. Col. Morton calls himself a "synthetic westerner" on the basis of his 18 years' service with the west's crack cavalry unit of the permanent force, the Lord Strathcona's Horse.

**May Have Shot 2000 Pheasants**

An estimate on the number of pheasants taken in Markham Township during the recent pheasant shoot was placed at between 1500 and 2000 birds by a township official a few days ago. Clerk Charlie Hoover declined to make a guess, but said he would be able to give a fair estimate when all the returns are made. It appears that hunters are supplied with cards that may be sent back to the clerk informing him of their success, or the number of birds taken. With this information before them the officials can better gauge the number of licenses to sell each year, and how the stock should be replenished each season. 1,000 birds were dumped into the Township last spring.

So far scores of cards have been returned by hunters indicating that excellent success was obtained by the great majority. Hunters were permitted three cock birds each day, and there were 500 licenses in addition to the local licenses. Not all hunters however were out on both days of the shoot.

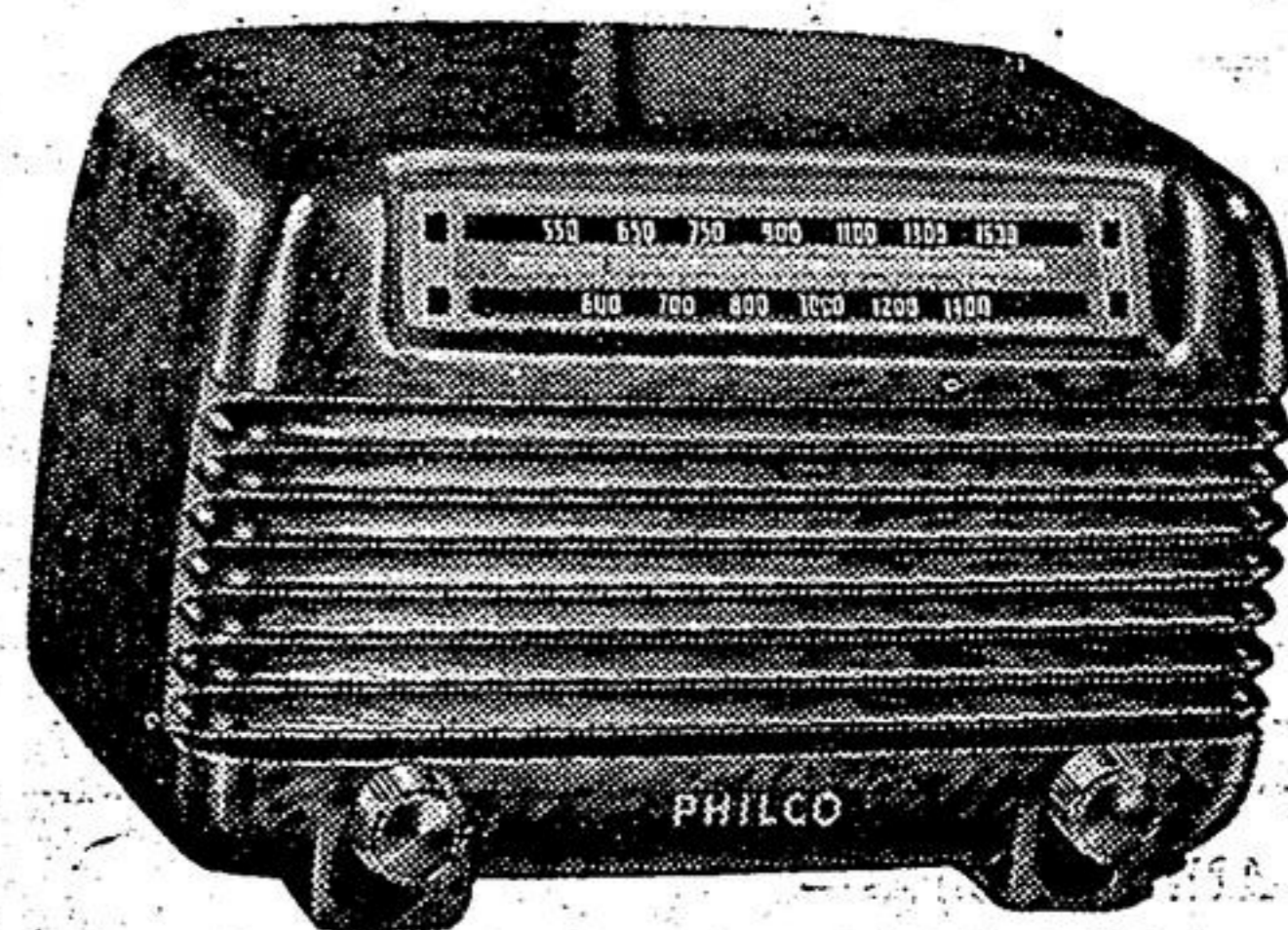
