Postoffice Here Has Airograph Forms

Forms For New Speedy Service Overseas Now Available In Stouffville.

Postmaster Eugene Leavens announces that a supply of the new airograph forms has now been received at the local Post Office. Similar forms will be supplied to every Post Office in the Dominion and will enable Canadians to speedily communicate with their friends and relatives serving in the armed forces now in Great Britain. Every Canadian will have the opportunity of using, for a ten-cent charge, a new form of communication first employed by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth in sending greetings of British women to General Sir Claud Auchinleck, Commander in Chief in the Middle East.

On special forms now available at the post office here, the message is written in black ink, a ten-cent stamp is affixed to the form which is then sent to Toronto, a photograph is made and film is sent to Britain by plane. An enlargement of the film is then printed and delivered to the soldier to whom it is addressed. This new service goes into effect Nov. 15. It is designed to eliminate the lengthy delays inevitable when mail is despatched by ship. The original messages are photographed because in this way a roll of film can contain 1,700 messages and will weigh only one-hundredth of the original 1,700 airograph forms.

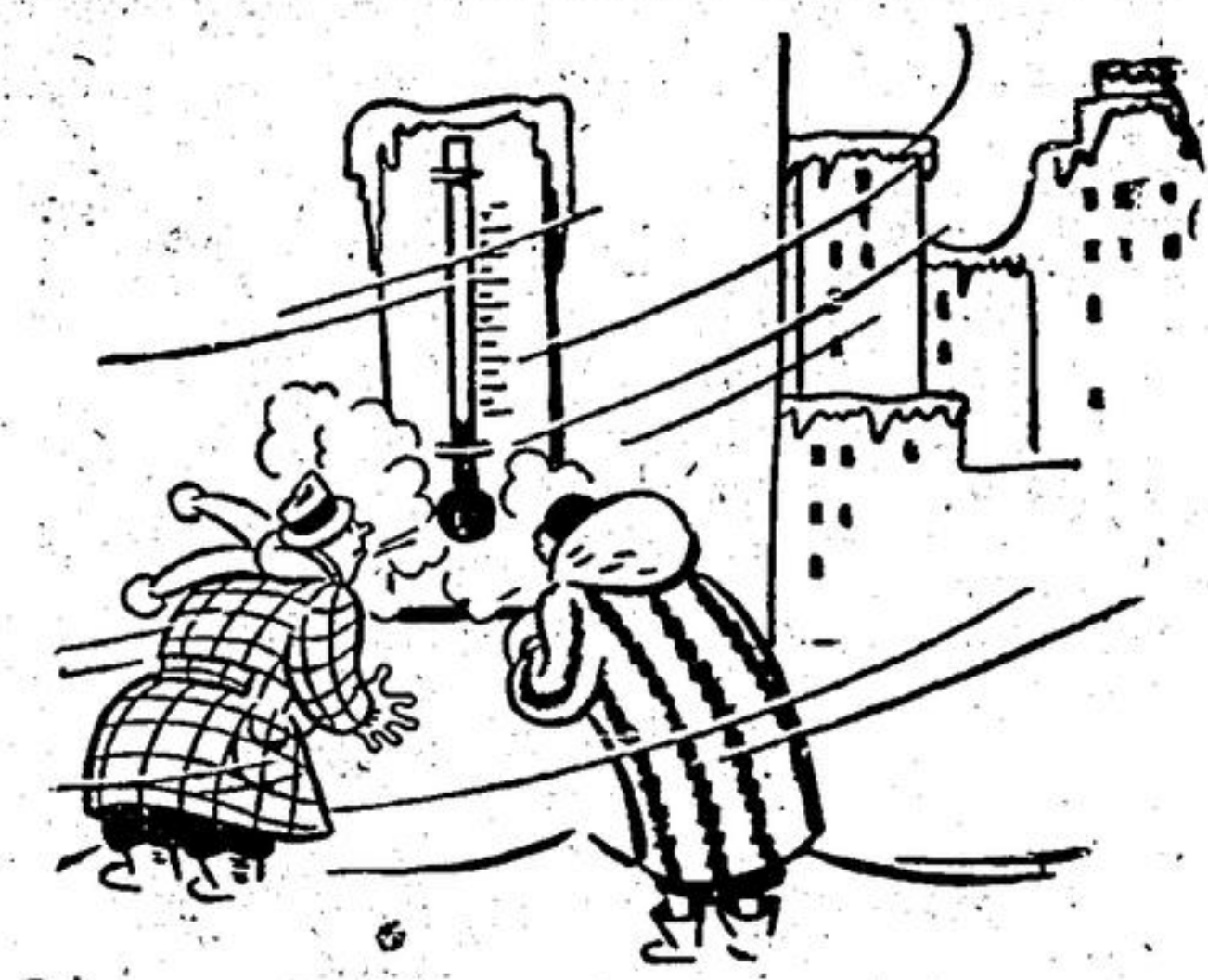

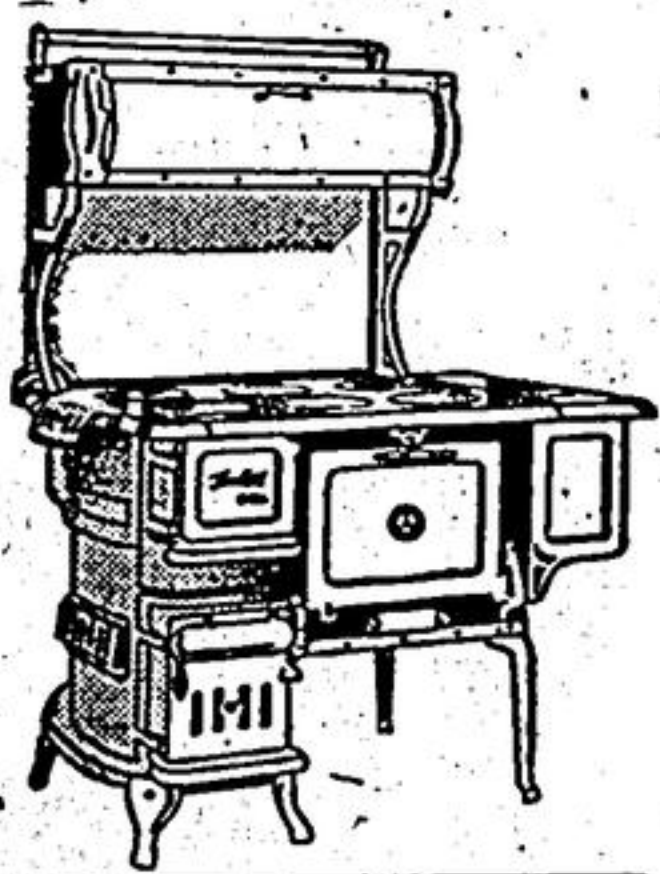
