The couple made their home for long years on a farm at Balsam, later residing for short time in Myrtle and Whitby. Mr. Jones passed away in 1935, and since that time his late wife has made her home in Claremont, where she has been in poor health for the past two years. Deceased was a member of the Claremont Baptist Church for nearly 50 years and despite her failing health she has been a most cheerful and patient sufferer since being confined to her bed. Of the large Madill family, four brothers survive, they being, Henry and Albert of Harrow, Ont., Russell of Detroit and Fred in Toronto, also two sisters, Mrs. George Lee of Stouffville and Mrs. Esther Palmer, Claremont. One brother George is deceased.

There are two daughters, Mrs. Robert Sadler, Blackstock and Mrs. Allan Manderson, Balsam, also one son, Raymond of Kirkland Lake, five grandchildren and two great grandchildren. The funeral on Monday afternoon was conducted from the late home, the service being taken by Rev. Daniels and Rev. Kennedy. Rev. Keith Daniels, son of the local pastor sang. Pall bearers were, Messrs. J. H. Madill, Albert Madill, Fred Madill, George Lee, John Madill, Allan Manderson. Lovely floral tributes were received from friends and relatives.

Mr. and Mrs. Ivan McLaughlin spent Saturday in Toronto.

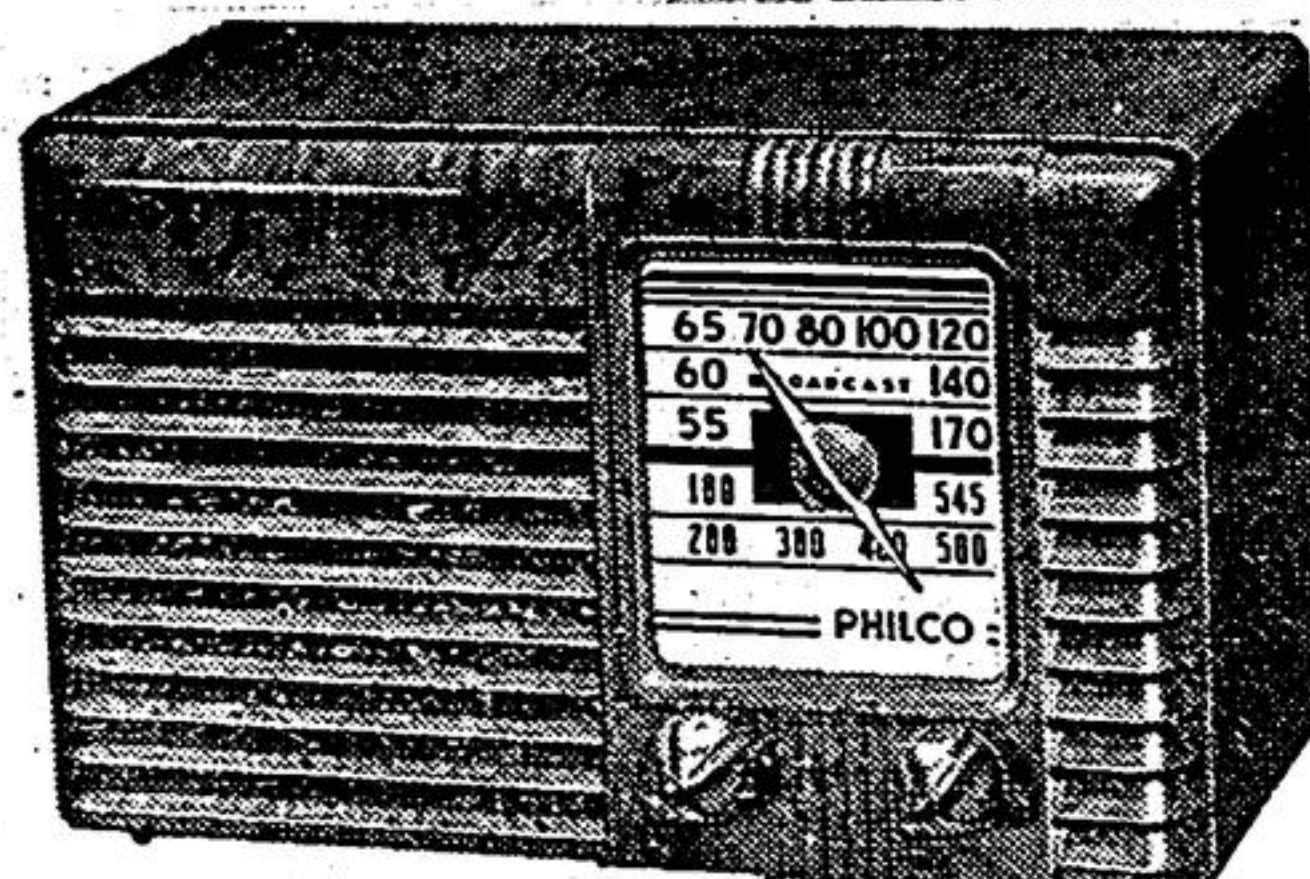
Miss Mildred Clark underwent an operation for goitre in a Toronto hospital on Friday and is doing very nicely.
