Prominent in Sport Fred Cowie Dead

Resident of Zephyr and Clarendon Dies Suddenly From Heart Attack—Was only 53 Years of Age.

The death of Frederick Cowie at Zephyr came as a shock to friends around Clarendon where he was so well known and had lived for years. He died suddenly on Tuesday of heart trouble, and will be buried at Clarendon on Thursday afternoon, leaving his late home in Zephyr to reach Clarendon United Church for service at 2:15.

Member of the old Shamrock football team of Green River he took a keen interest in sports, and when at Clarendon was president of the Lawn Bowling Club and the Park Board. He was in his 56th year.

Surviving are his wife and one daughter Mrs. Thos. Phillips of Brougham, and one granddaughter.

INTERESTING PERSONAGE IS MRS. PEARSON

Tripping along the street like any modern business woman, her arms full of mail Mrs. John Pearson of Clark street, was accosted by The Tribune on Tuesday morning. It was just the day after her 85th birthday and the deluge of letters and cards were from old friends who hadn't forgotten. She had been getting mail like this for several days, and if you are privileged to know Mrs. Pearson you will understand why she enjoys such a wide circle of friends. Despite her age she is happy, congenial, and in perfect possession of all her faculties. Indeed, Mrs. Pearson does all her own housework, and a neighbor confided in us that she doesn't take to the new modern way of washing clothes, but insists on the putting them over the scrub board to be really washed. It was just 67 years to a day on Tuesday that Mrs. Pearson and her late husband located in this town. He was a sectionman, and died in 1926. Mrs. Pearson spent her birthday at the home of her brother with Mr. and Mrs. Joan Lewis, just east of town.

LAGEER MULCHED \$10 OVER CAR COLLISION

Ernest Lageer of Ballantrae was assessed \$10 and costs by Magistrate Ebbs at Whitby on a charge of careless driving when his car and one driven by Alex. Ross of Oshawa collided just opposite the farm of Allen Meyer. Judgement was given out on Tuesday after being reserved for the past two weeks. Reg. Button defended Lageer.

At the trial Ross told the court that he had been driving east along the county road between Stouffville and Clarendon when the accident occurred. "I was on my own side of the road and just coming down a slight grade when I saw the accused man's car about fifty feet away. He was coming straight at me and driving on my side of the road," Ross asserted.

"He was so far over on my side that one of his wheels was almost on the grass. I swerved across the road onto his side but he swerved at the same time, and the impact took place in the centre of the road," related Ross. He said he had been taken to a doctor in Stouffville for medical attention and sustained facial lacerations a back injury, and two teeth driven into his lip. "I don't think he had his lights on when I first saw him fifty feet away," declared the witness who stated that in any event Lageer's headlights were "very dim." Ross stated he had had one drink about half an hour before the accident.

Duncan Spang told the court he had been the first person to arrive on the scene after the collision occurred. "I heard the crash half a mile away," stated Spang. He said Lageer told him "I was blinded by his lights."

Spang stated that Ross seemed to be in a dazed condition and said "take me to a doctor. Get me to hell out of Pickering township."

"When I first met him on the road that was the first thing I noticed, the liquor," the witness asserted. He said that Ross had quite evidently been on his own side of the road prior to the accident and that skidmarks showed where he had swerved in an effort to avoid the impact.

Provincial Constable James Sutherland stated that Ross was definitely not intoxicated. He had been to the doctor's and returned to the accident when interviewed by police, the officer said. "His speech was a bit thick because his lip was badly cut. I questioned him about liquor on his breath and he stated he had received a drink at the doctor's. He certainly wasn't intoxicated or he

would have been charged," the officer declared.

Lageer declared that he had been travelling west on his way home from the county plowing match on the night of October 22nd. He said he had his lights on even before he reached Clarendon and that he was "blinded by headlights on the Ross car."

"I couldn't see so I looked out and pulled over by mistake. I could not see. That's all there was to it."

In answer to queries by Crown Attorney Allan F. Annis, LaGeer said there was not a tail-light on his car but that there had been one.

Two Mennonite witnesses, J. Meyer and Lloyd Meyer, testified that Ross had asked at their house if he could phone to Clarendon. The witnesses were given a special oath of "affirmation" by Magistrate F. S. Ebbs after defense counsel Button pointed out "instead of swearing to the truth they always affirm it."
