Two of the highest valued logs ever to be sawed in Robert Ratcliff's saw-mill since the mill was erected about a century ago were brought from Toronto last week by Mr. Ratcliff. The two logs each ten feet long and twelve inches in diameter from the forests of Brazil and known as Rosewood, weighed eight hundred lbs each and were sold at twenty cents per lb. which made the two small logs worth \$320.00. We buy and sell nearly everything by the pound, but this is the first we have heard of buying logs by weight. Mr. Ratcliff informs us that he had to sign papers that he would be responsible for the logs till they were delivered in Toronto as lumber, also that he was requested to save even the smallest slivers for delivery. Mr. Ratcliff is doing the sawing for the Barry Lumber Co. for delivery to the Williams Music Co., to be used mainly in the manufacture of violins.
