## UNIONVILLE HERD AVERAGES \$107 AT FARM AUCTION

The farm stock sale for Robert Holden, north of Unionville, attracted a tremendous crowd last Saturday, and prices ruled high in some lines. Entire proceeds totalled \$2,500, with prices for cows being a feature of the sale. Clarke Prentice, auctioneer, declared prices the best average for a herd in the county this fall, when he knocked down a bunch of milkers away over the \$100 mark, to average \$107.35 for the herd. A bull sold for \$79. Cameron Walkington, King auctioneer, assisted Mr. Prentice.

Horses showed a tendency to firm, when a mare brought \$97. Hay is in good demand and brought, baled, \$16.00 a ton. Oats sold for 50c a bushel. The corn binder fetched \$48, hay rake \$40, and on smaller articles there were excellent prices when a wheelbarrow sold for \$8, and a corner whatnot in the furniture line brought \$8. A 6-foot logging chain got \$3.

The farm has been sold to a Toronto man, and the Holdens are moving to near Agincourt.
