A very elderly lady died in Toronto last week in the person of Elizabeth Rowden who lived in Stouffville years ago when this place was an active junction point on the old G.T.R. and train crews worked out of here. Mrs. Rowden's husband Thos. Rowden was a conductor, and built and resided in the house now owned and occupied by Mrs. Ben. Dolen on O'Brien avenue. He died a number of years ago, and the funeral for Mrs. Rowden took place from the residence of her niece, Mrs. F. Gomme, 28 Raglan avenue, for interment in a city cemetery. There were two Rowden boys running on this line. Mr. E. J.
