Farmers are Not Greatly Enthused Over Oil Yet

Interested farmers met at Vandorf on Tuesday to discuss the proposal put to them by private people to permit oil wells on their farms in the Vandorf area. While the farmers were not very keen, they were let know that the possibility of oil being located along the high ridge in that area is very favorable. Information secured by one of the farmers was that the geology of that section gives rise to the belief that oil could be found, and the Department marks it as one of the most favorable spots in Ontario judging from the geology of the land.

The particular area is along the second concession from the Vandorf sideroad to north of the Aurora road and extending east to the fourth concession.

Private interests have approached the farmers in the district concerned and it was these farmers who met representatives on Tuesday evening, but came to no decision. The farmers want more time to investigate, they say. On the other hand, the parties assure the farmers: they will pay for any damage, if any, caused in their exploration work. Should a well be located on a farm, the owner of the land would receive one-eighth of its revenue, which is quite a considerable sum.

NO INQUEST YET

Investigation is being continued concerning the death of Isabelle Whyte of Ringwood, and while it is very likely an inquest will be held, no date is yet set, the press is advised by Dr. Ball, coroner who conducted a post-mortem.

HEPBURN PROPOSES FURTHER UNION

liquidating their herds and selling their breeding stock. The farmer's problem has been aggravated by the high wages paid for unskilled labor in military camps and Royal Canadian Air Force schools, and other war orders.

Premier Hespburn sums up the situation thus: "Faced with lower prices for his produce, the farmer has begun liquidating his stock, selling his brood sows and sacrificing registered milk cows and heifers. The farmer is on the bottom rung of the ladder. A ceiling has been fixed for certain commodities but no floor. Now the British war effort is predicted upon a continual flow of commodities from North America. Britain has sufficient food for a few months only and depends largely upon imports. The serious shortage of farm labor is bound to curtail production in Ontario. The prices of concentrated feeds have gone up steadily. We can lower the cost of production by introducing cheaper grains. We have in Western Canada hundreds of millions of bushels of surplus grain and the federal government might be persuaded to move some of it eastward at a nominal figure. We do not want to add to the cost of living of the heroic people of Britain. We could subsidize the production of bacon and cheese. I fear that Mr. Gardiner is not sympathetically inclined toward the farmers of Ontario. How is the farmer going to live when others are guaranteed a standard of living while he is pushed lower and lower.

M.P.P. Opposes Two-Year-Term

I think that Whitchurch Township did the right thing in turning down the proposed two-year term for municipal councils," says Morgan Baker to The Tribune this week. Throughout the counties of Ontario and York the proposal was given a tremendous defeat at the poll, and the same fate would have befallen it in those places where the people were too indifferent to insist on a vote.
