 I wish to thank you and the Red Cross for the parcel that I received today, and can assure you that the contents was indeed very useful as it contained things that are so hard to get over here. We have been over five weeks now and have only had one air-raid warning though nothing happened. We are not a great way from London and Jerry generally flies over on his way to the Midlands. I was to Sheffield on my leave and the shopping part of that place is a mess. Jerry seems generally to make a mess of civilian areas when he puts on a blitz. The weather here is mild and damp and the boys feel the cold and wish they were back where it was drier. But still taking it all around we are not too badly off. We will all be happier when we really get moving, instead of this waiting. Thanks again, yours truly,


