

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Midshipman Donald Mackenzie Waters, of Ottawa and Cobourg, has been mentioned in dispatches for valor for his part in the Battle of Crete. A son of Col. Mackenzie Waters, former Toronto architect now overseas with the artillery, he is 20 years old and has been twice torpedoed in the Mediterranean.
