Mr. and Mrs. David Crosier and Irene had dinner with his mother at Port Perry on Sunday.

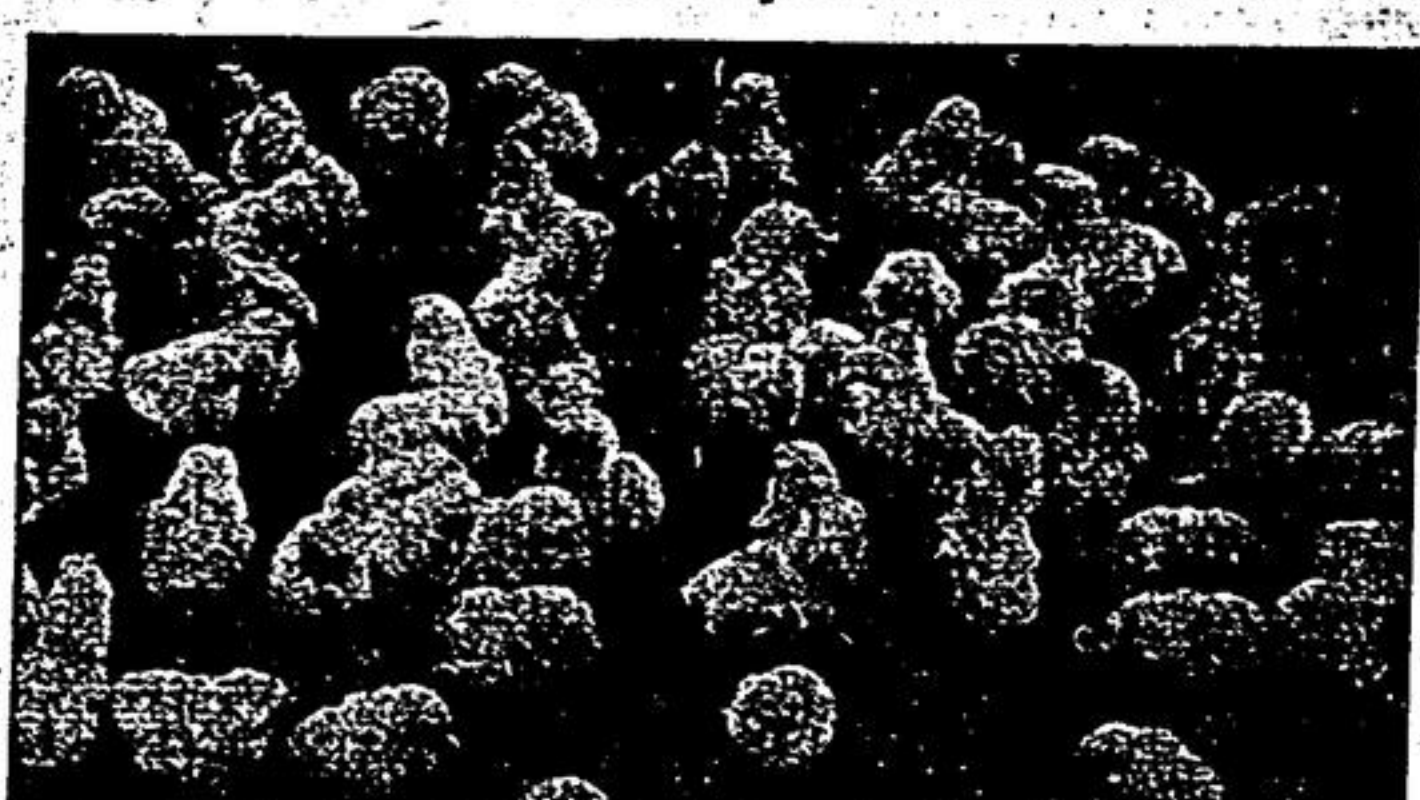
Mrs. J. McDonald Kinsale is visiting for a few days with her father Mr. A. Davis, who is still confined to his bed.
