**YOUR 1942 TAXES LOOK LIKE A WAR**

Income tax forms of the 1942 model are now going out to all postmasters calling on single men making \$750 and married men earning \$1,500 to subscribe liberally. Heavy penalties are provided for tax evaders in Stouffville and anywhere else.

Form T1, which covers those making \$5,000 a year and under, confirmed the fact that Canada is fighting a war that takes money—that the taxpayer will have to dig up more money this year and that more people will be taxed.

For the first time in years there is no Ontario income tax to figure along with federal tax.

Here's what Form T1 says you'll pay this year on what you made in 1941:

On net taxable income under \$1,000—15 per cent. Between \$1,000 and \$2,000—tax is \$150 plus 20 per cent on excess over \$1,000.

Between \$2,000 and \$3,000, tax is \$350 plus 25 per cent on excess over \$2,000.

Between \$3,000 and \$4,000, tax is \$600 plus 30 per cent on excess of \$3,000.

Between \$4,000 and \$5,000, tax is \$900 plus 33 per cent on amount in excess of \$4,000.

Exemptions

If the taxpayer is single, \$750 of what he makes does not figure for income tax assessment. If he's married, he can exempt \$1,500. But if his wife has an income exceeding \$750 a year, the exemption is cut to \$750 each.

Outside of the new schedule of higher taxation, and the fact that Ontario isn't mentioned, there are few changes.

Forehanded persons who have been paying on the instalment plan will have to raise their ante. In September, 1941, the government allowed a system whereby income taxpayers could turn in their taxes over a one-year period, in monthly payments.


