Higher Pay for Grader Operator

Saturday's session of Uxbridge Township Council was a remarkably light one for business, and little of public interest was transacted. A by-law was passed increasing the salary of the Road Superintendent from \$650 per year to \$800, of which \$150 was marked for the operation of his car. The pay of Cecil Wallace, operator of the road maintainer was advanced from 40c per hour to 45c, and when the maintainer is working on contract work he will receive 50c per hour.

The annual bylaw providing for township officials saw few changes made. As pound keeper Clarence Gaul replaces Jno. Leek, Oscar Tindall replaces Norman Hogg, and George Hill for Robert Redshaw.
