We are sorry to learn that Mr. Ralph Faulkner has been home from Pickering on the sick list, some of the children have also been sick with colds and absent from township schools as a result.

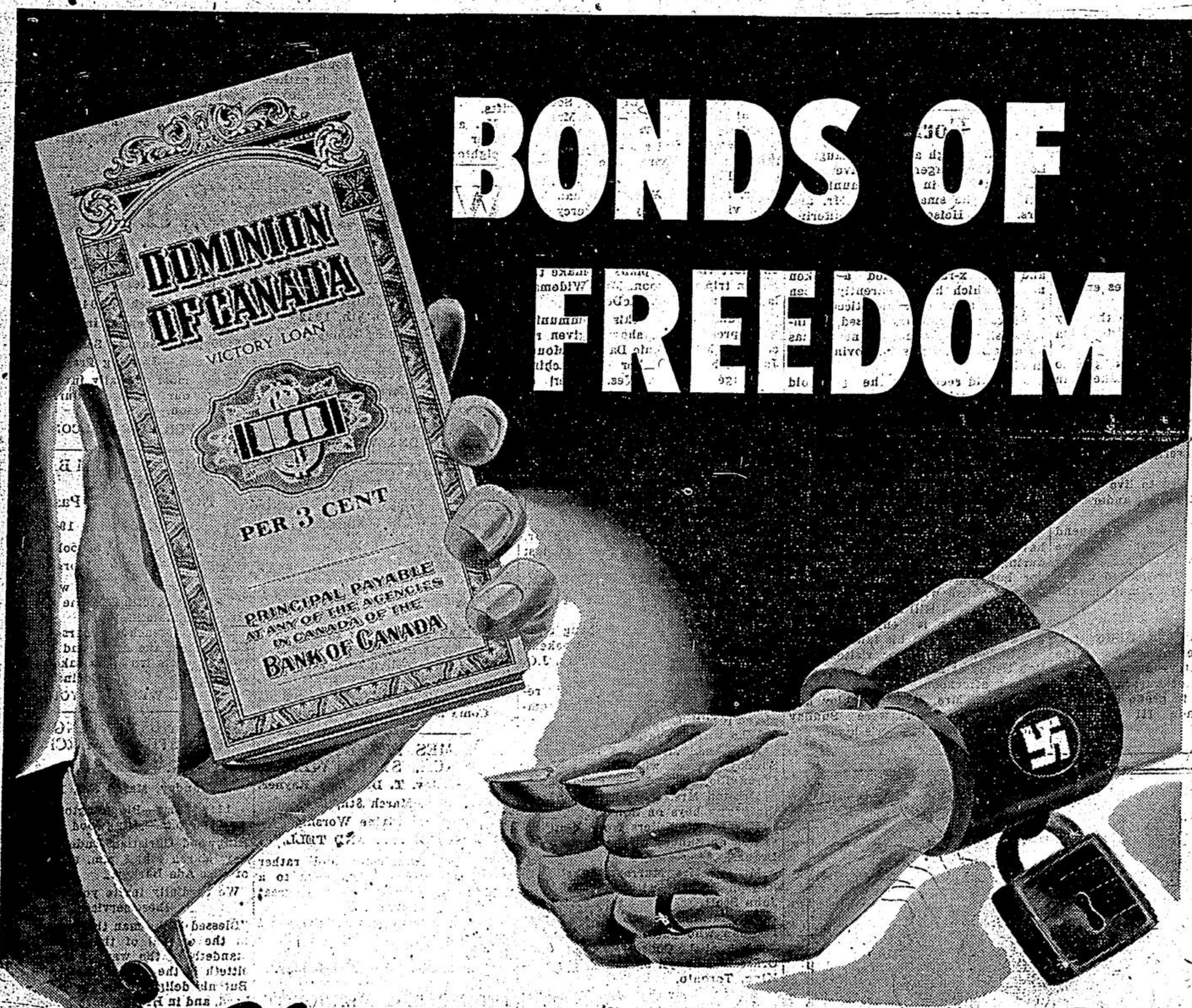
The Latcham family and Baldwin family spent a pleasant evening at White's last week.
