## GOOSE WHEAT AT AUCTION BRINGS \$1.28 BUSHEL

One of the biggest sales this season in the district where it was held took place on the John Kerswell farm Vaughan just south of Bond Lake when proceeds of the public auction mounted to \$5,800, realized in just four and a half hours of selling by A. S. Farmer. A feature of the sale was sky rocketing price for horses. A 6-year-old gray mare went for \$150, and a bay mare same age brought \$150, while a bay rising 4 years went at \$161. The high priced cow brought \$150, and a registered Holstein calf \$61. The whole list of cows averaged \$100. Urban oats bid to 82c, barley 68c, and wheat \$1.10 with goose wheat for seed topping \$1.28. Hay in the mow sold for \$12 a ton.

## COUNCIL CANNOT REINVEST CLERGY RESERVE FUNDS

longing to the township of Whitchurch Clergy Reserve Account. There is \$5,015 in this account which the present taxpayers inherited long years ago, and which has been borrowed by the councils down through the years, on which they pay interest to the fund, the proceeds of which accrue to school sections of the municipality.

The auditor warned the council that there was nothing to do but to pay this money from the general account to the schools and disburse it over the various sections. He said that this would not increase or decrease taxes, but it would raise the general tax rate and reduce the trustee rates correspondingly.

Further the auditor said: "I would ask that a bond be procured covering the dog tax collector who is also township-assessor." There is a bond on the treasurer and one on the tax collector, of \$4,000 and \$5,000 respectively.

Surplus over expenditures in 1940 he said was \$1749, which represents only a fraction of a mill. The auditor thought a better surplus would be advisable.

Council adopted the report, and the usual copies will be printed according to law, and made available to the taxpayers.
