She is a trained switchboard operator and that is what she is going to do in the air force. Another new recruit was Mrs. E. D. McCoy, 22 (Right) whose husband, a sergeant-observer in the A.A.F., was killed in action Dec. 5, 1941. She applied for the air force shortly after.

AIR CADETS BEGIN TRAINING FRIDAY

silhouettes; instructional charts of engines and airframes and stretchers and blankets for first aid work. Some of the most useful equipment that it is planned to issue will be such items as aero engines, airframes and components which have become unserviceable for flying training, but yet have great value for classroom instructional purposes.

"Air cadet units during the summer holidays will be given familiarization courses of one week's duration at the nearest suitable R.C.A.F. station. Quarters in barracks or under canvas—rations and transportation will be provided by the air force. This will enable air cadets to acquire a first-hand knowledge of life in the air force, besides affording them an opportunity of undergoing training under service conditions. It is also planned to give squadrons still greater help through staff officers at R.C.A.F. commands and to provide for regular inspections by R.C.A.F. officers."

Important functions will continue to be performed by the Air Cadet League of Canada, which founded the air cadet organization last June, bringing it up to its present flourishing condition. These will include the promotion, through provincial and local committees of formation of new units, the publication of the magazine, "Canadian Air Cadet," the raising of financial assistance through its local and district committee for units and the provision of trophies for competition between air cadet units to encourage efficiency.

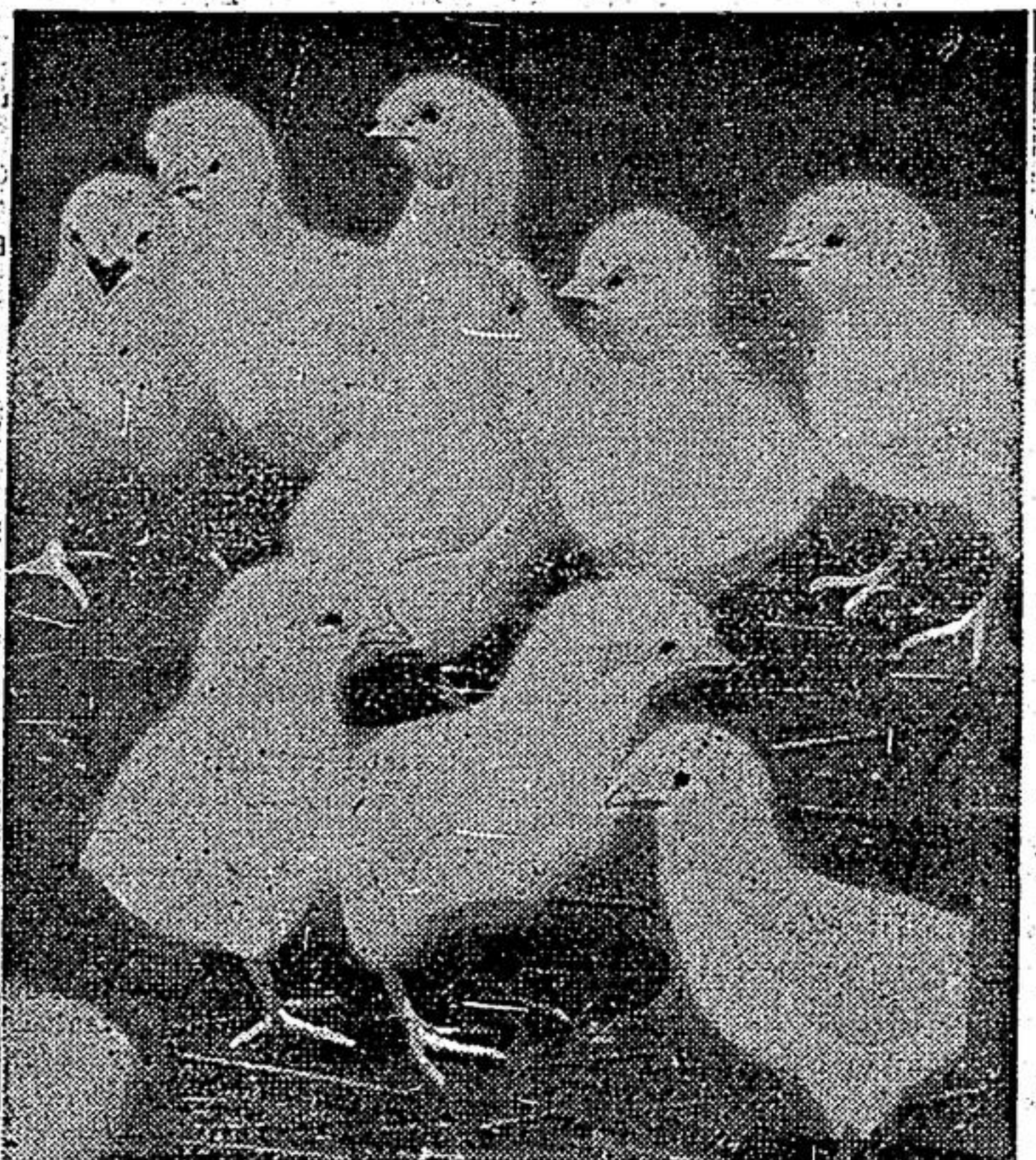
