Owen Sound captured the title after seven minutes and 45 seconds of overtime play in the third game of the final series in the northern arena.

Owen Sound won the final two games after tying the opener of the best-of-three series. All games were played at Owen Sound.

Ken Dolson took Shear's pass to break a 2-2 tie which prevailed after regular play, to give the home team the championship.

Late in the opening period Cy Proctor gave Owen Sound the advantage. He fired a hard, high shot past Harper, who had little chance on the play as his view was blocked.

Owen Sound attacked constantly during the first part of the period only to have Harper smother the shots. Bloomfield went off as the result of nose injuries suffered in the first, but he re-entered the game early in the third.
