Favours Abolition of Division Courts

Not long ago the present government at Queen's Park, through the deputy minister of Municipal Affairs attempted to take from the municipalities the right to make their own assessments and collect the local taxes. Widespread opposition caused the measure to be abandoned for the present. Now it is announced that Attorney-General Conant is in favor of abolishing the Division Courts, by extending the powers of the magistrate to deal with small claims up to \$25. "A very effective step" toward clearing up the present situation with its high cost of cases, says Mr. Conant. The Attorney-General states that court costs now running \$4 would be about \$2. This is hard to understand.

Locally, the situation is that one of these small cases demands five or six witnesses, and under the new scheme they would have to travel from Markham or Stouffville to Toronto where the case would be tried. If there are two or three such cases, then there may be fifteen or twenty people made to travel to the city, whereas at pre-

Cream Cans

It is now illegal for anyone to retain a can belonging to any dairy manufacturer unless in regular use for the shipping of milk or cream. It is also an offence for any creamery to send out a can belonging to another creamery for the shipment of cream to any other than the owner of the can.

This makes it an offence to put anything save milk or cream into a can, and to hold a can for any purpose. In other words, if a person is found with a cream can in his possession containing anything other than cream, regardless of its condition, he is liable to a penalty of up to \$50 for a first offence and up to \$100 for subsequent ones with provision for imprisonment or not less than one month.
