Sixth year University of Toronto medical students have appeared in classrooms wearing uniforms of the Canadian Army Medical Corps. With private's pay and living allowances totalling about \$2.30 per day they continue to study and, on completion of their internships will be ready for service as medical officers anywhere. More than 100 medical students have joined under this plan and army officials expect the total to reach 175.
