COURT CUTS \$650 OF ASSESSMENT ROLL

Mr. Frank Beach, appealing on Lot 28, Con. 2, 200 acres of ranch land, assessment reduced from \$1,700 to \$1,500.

Mrs. Hannah Rolston, appealing on E. Part of Lot 31, Con. 4, 75 acres, Assessment reduced from \$800 to \$700, no building on either of those properties.

Mr. R. R. Grant, appealing on W. half of Lot 9, Con. 7, on account of fire destroying buildings, reduced \$150.

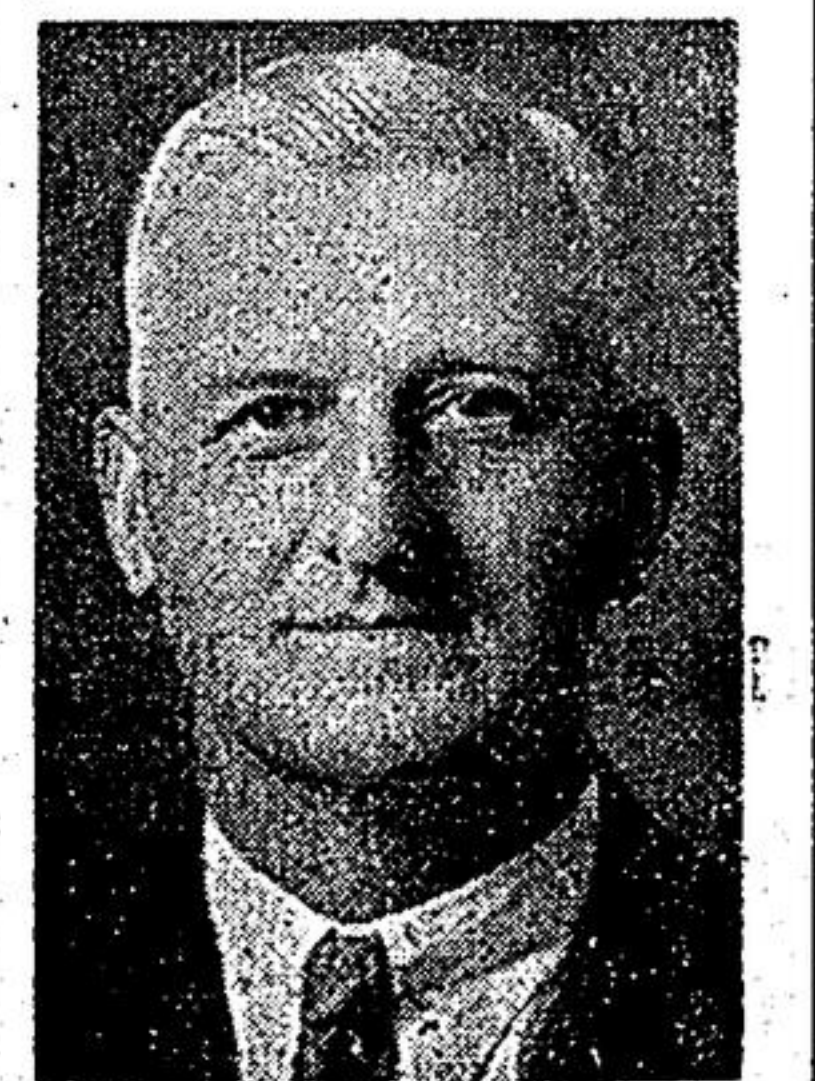
Mr. Hoyle Brethour, appealing on pts. Lots 33-34 Con. 7, 190 acres assessed for \$5,200, lowered \$200.
