No Sense to This Waste

"Altitudes in Northern Ontario," is the name of government blue book just issued by the Department of Mines and Resources for Canada. The book of nearly 200 pages gives names of thousands of streams in the far north to the smallest creek, their depth and location, something useful only to a mere handful of people.
