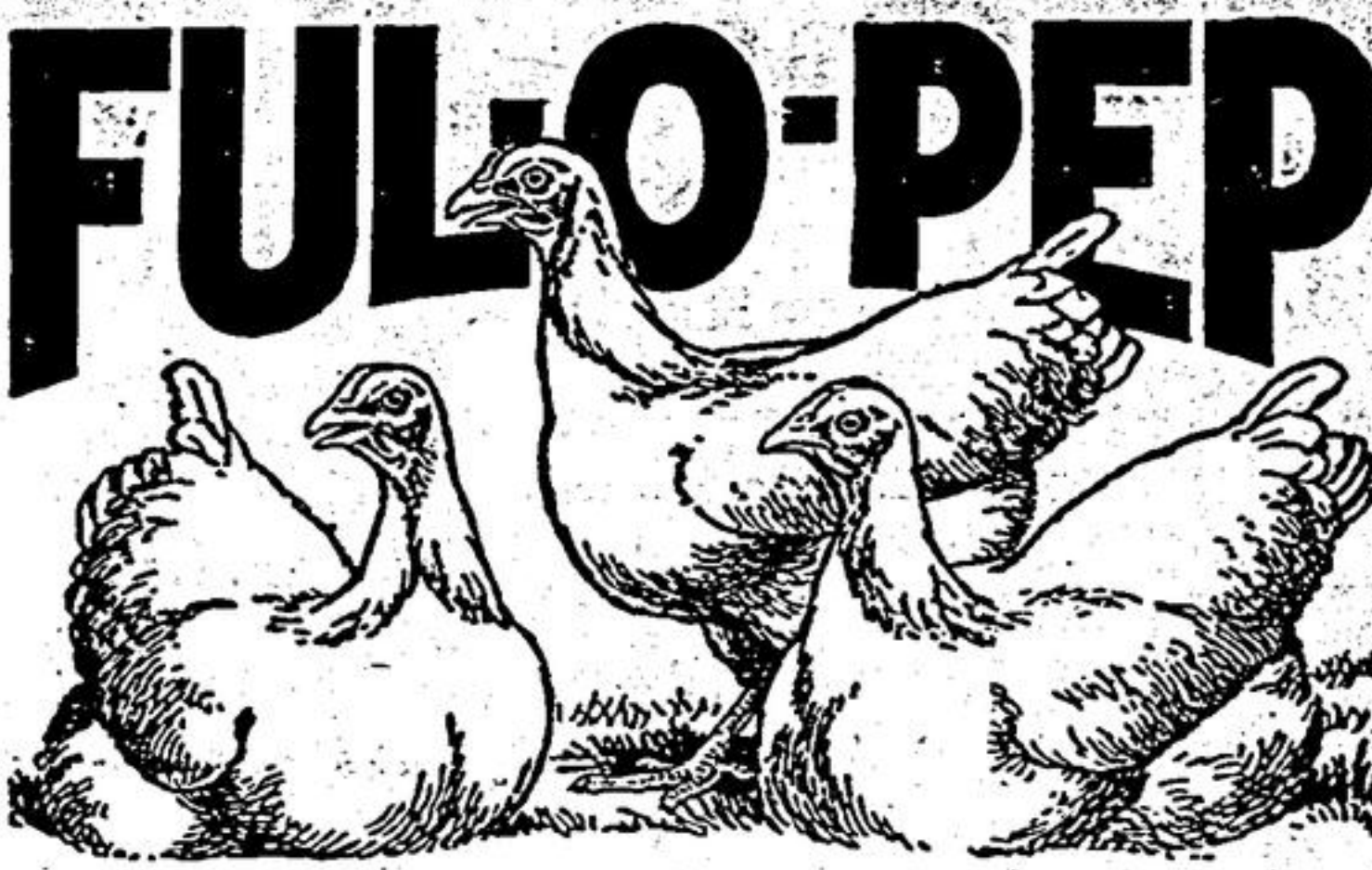
**Record Attendance at Bible School**
