A number from here were present at the farewell party for Sgt. Pilot L. Fairles on Monday evening, at Mr. Floyd Fairles.

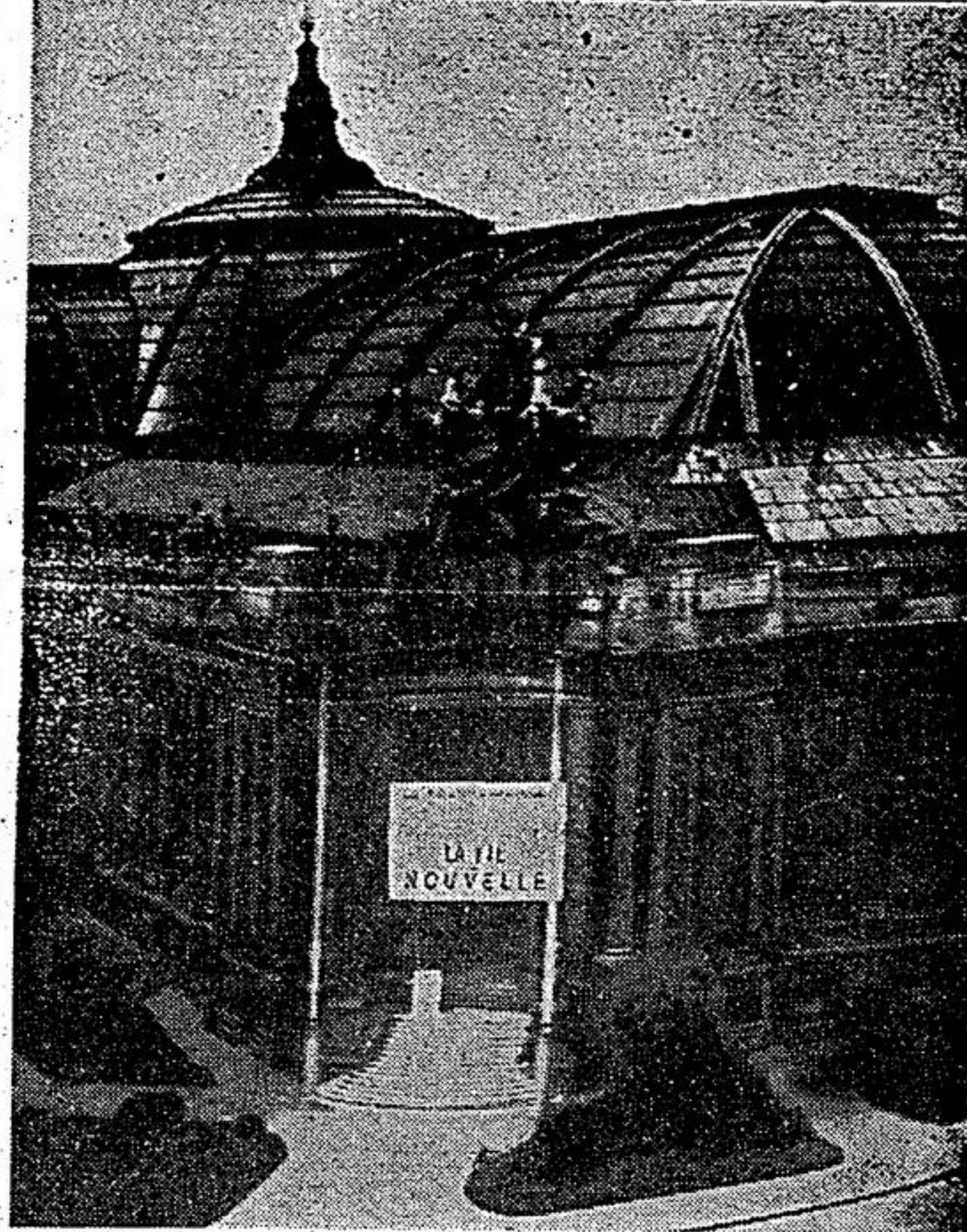
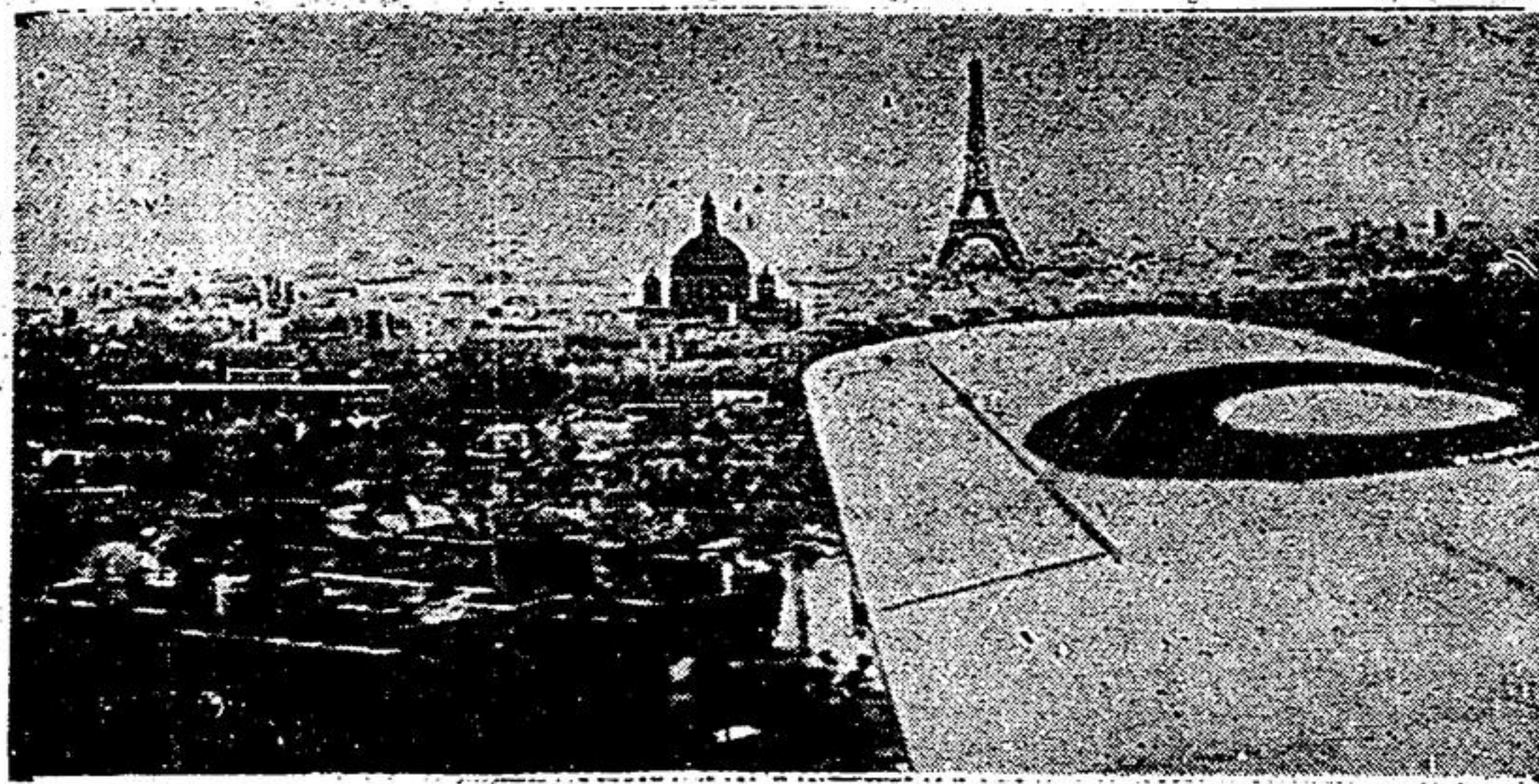

While the enslaved peoples of Europe await liberation their hopes are kept alive not only by the thunderous raids on vital war centres in the Ruhr and along the Baltic. For example, one mid-day last month the people of Paris stared up and saw the target markings of an RAF Beaufighter flashing over their heads, lower than the church spires, lower than the third-storey windows of the great desolate department stores. In the Beau were Flight Lieut. A. K. Gatward and Sergt. G. Fern of the Coastal Command, making one of the war's most daring gestures. They flew their Beau down the avenue of the Champs-Elysees like a taxi and dropped a streaming Tricolor near

the Unknown Soldiers Tomb—that for the French—and sent a volley of cannonfire against the German H.Q. near the Place de la Concorde—that for the Boche. Here is one of the pictures they brought home. Under the Beau's port wing are the roofs of Paris. In the background the Eiffel Tower and the dome of Les Invalides, where Napoleon is buried.
