Let Passengers Ride in Trucks

When a truck is being operated for the purpose of hauling any products or materials, as many as two persons may ride in the cab as passengers in addition to the driver. This ruling, which applied equally to farm trucks and those operated by others, comes from James Stewart, administrator of services for the Wartime Prices and Trade Board.

There have been numerous inquiries from members of the rural population in Western Ontario regarding the effect of a Board order issued in April and dealing with the transportation of goods.
That order (No. 121) provided that no person should operate, with or without compensation, any truck for the transportation of persons other than the driver and assistant or assistants necessary to load or unload goods. It is not intended, however, that when a truck is transporting goods it may not also carry persons for whom there is room in the cab, for example, a farmer's wife going to town to shop. In fact, it is expected that whenever shopping can be done on trips that are necessary for the hauling of produce, grain, etc., the practice will be followed.

The regulation became necessary partly in order to conserve trucking equipment. The manufacture of trucks has virtually stopped, in order to help meet the need for more munitions and other war supplies; hence it is imperative that everything possible be done to make sure that present trucking facilities for taking care of essential movements of goods will last out the war. Owners of trucks are not at present limited in the amount of gasoline they may obtain, whereas limits have had to be placed on the amount available for passenger automobiles. This situation itself has made it necessary to control the driving of trucks for non-essential purposes in order to restrict consumption of vital supplies of rubber, gasoline and oil.
