## Women to Register on Sept. 14th

The registration of Canadian women will begin on Sept. 14, with the twenty to twenty-four-year-old age groups, it has been announced.

The objective of the new inventory of Canada's woman power will be to direct single women into essential war industries rather than to have employers build up huge staffs of married women with small children.

The registration will show exactly how many single women are available to meet the increasing shortages of workers in war industries.

Married women up until now had been allowed to drift into employment in war industries because no known reservoir of single workers existed, and employment advertisements had stated no preference.

Selective Service officials will restrict employment permits to the groups of single women or married women without children, it is revealed.

The registration of women will be compulsory, but they will not be compelled to take jobs.

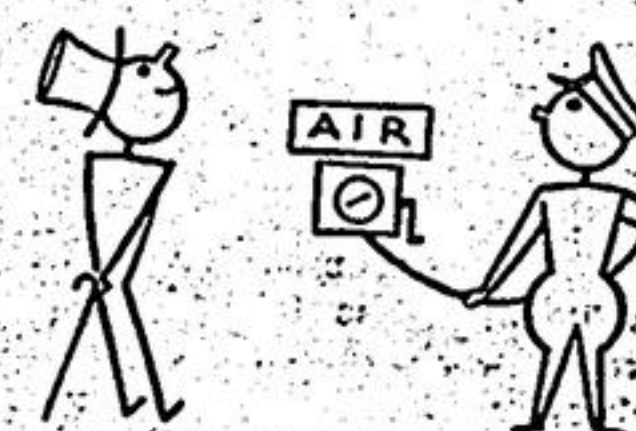
