FACTS ABOUT THE VOTERS' LIST

The Voters List for the Township of Whitchurch has just been issued. You are expected to examine a copy and if your name is omitted, you may appeal to have it put on the list. Years ago the two old political parties held meetings all over the various ridings and examined these lists with a view to adding to or striking off names, but today it is different. In their desire to distribute election jobs nowadays the government in office orders an entirely new list compiled and printed, and the one that the township or village had printed for that year is discarded. This proves a great waste in the rural municipalities where the local list is perfectly good for any election.

The new list issued by Whitchurch and first posted on Aug. 24 contains 1,942 voters, of whom 829 are marked "no" which means that they are not counted when it comes to counting up the number of voters in the municipality for obtaining a deputy or second deputy reeve. If a municipality has more than one thousand voters they are entitled to a deputy reeve, and if they have more than 1,500, a second may be appointed or elected. However, the women voters are not to be counted when reckoning up these names, otherwise there would be too many deputy Reeves in the county councils of Ontario.

In Whitchurch the list reveals that there are 860 persons entitled to serve as jurors. The Voters' List is a book of some 120 pages.
