night and I could see everything so we just map read our way to the target. It was a large factory. I dropped bombs and they went straight into the roof of the main building. Then up from it came huge sheets of flame and we could hear explosions. We were at 4,000 feet but everything was thrown around and the plane did everything but stand on its nose.

The pilot recovered and brought the plane home and that was his story. The pilot, a Canadian is home now, instructing and I met his second pilot over here. He is also an instructor.

I wish again to thank all those who help to make life sweeter and happier for us who are over here waiting for Jerry to try something on England.
