Dear Bert,
Thanks again for another parcel of comforts. I have received 4 since I came over and I can't tell you how much they are appreciated. It's grand to know that the folks are still thinking of us, and it really helps.

I met Mike Brown in Edinburgh just a week ago. He had just come out of the hospital a short time before where he had been convalescing from a crushed foot. He looks the picture of health now and we had a good talk about Stouffville.

He had seen Wally Nicholson and says he never saw anyone put on weight as he did. Mike weighs 184

so he isn't doing badly. He says that Gordon Lehman was right, the army makes a man of you and Mike is the proof needed.

I met Alfred later the same day in Lincoln. He had his first success that

week and shot up a Jerry. The German was not shot down but damaged. Alfred's plane was hit so hard he came out second best.

After a long time in Scotland I have now been returned to England and at present I am very close to my brother which is a nice change.

Leland Fairles has landed in the country and I had a letter from him this morning and hope to see him soon. Saw Glenn Gibbons shortly after he landed. It really is a real pleasure seeing home folks again.

I still get The Tribune regularly and also the Star Weekly so I get most of the news from home.

Dear Mr. Lichorish and Comrades,
Again, the convoy "got through" and your gift of cigarettes received.

Please accept my heartfelt thanks.

The usual acknowledgement card with its limited space is much too small to say all the things I would like to, as I do wish you all to know how much I appreciate your remembrance.

I was also pleased to get the July 2nd edition of The Tribune. The news from home is always so welcome and seeing names and places and people I know brings back pleasant memories of my boyhood days around Ringwood and Dickson's Hill, and the daily trip to Markham High School and also Stouffville Continuation School. No matter how far I roam that district will always be home.

The Tribune's full page "Salute to the Army" and your tribute to the men from the area now serving was indeed commendable and all those whose names appear, like me, proud of their home town and of the veterans who are taking such an interest in this new generation of soldiers who are now carrying the torch and must carry on until this affair is over.

My work takes me around a lot and I see the Canadian Corps in all its intensive training, and if I am any judge, you have a fine army over here. The Canadian is outstanding in a country that has so many races in uniform. He seems to be conspicuous as he is usually well dressed and seems to take pride in his personal appearance and deportment. They do get their names in the scandal sheets at times and their "whoopee" at times arouses the very reserved and stolid Englishman, but generally speaking they are very well behaved. They make lots of friends and are well liked, especially in the areas away from the permanent camps. The military towns are out to make what they can as they did in the last war, and always add a few pennies to the price of anything when they see the "Canada" shoulder flashes. They sure gave a good account of themselves at Dieppe, and indications point to the "lid blowing off" any
