The price of milk has been advanced in Uxbridge to 6 cents per pint and 11 cents per quart. Due to competition by three dairies the northern town has been supplied with pasteurized milk at a price below perhaps any town on the map. Steadily advancing costs forced an upward swing last week.

Manufacture of Ont. motor vehicle plates for 1943 has been ordered stopped by the federal steel controller in the interests of conserving for war industry, J. P. Bickell, Ontario registrar of motor vehicles, disclosed. As a consequence, with 400,000 plates of steel already manufactured at Guelph Reformatory, any needed balance will have a plate of some other material. Only one plate per vehicle is being manufactured.

Mrs. A.E. Armstrong, secretary of foreign missions of the Dominion Board was the speaker at the autumn thank-offering meeting of the Stouffville United Church W.M.S. on Thursday.
