**MAIL CHRISTMAS PARCELS
NOW TO FORCES
OVERSEAS**

Santa Claus must get off to an early start if our Armed Forces overseas are to get their Christmas boxes on time. Though that holiday seems far in the distance, TODAY is not too soon to start Christmas overseas mailings. The Postmaster General, Honourable William P. Mulock, advises that gifts should be sent now and during October the earlier the better—to ensure timely delivery. November 10th is the very latest date that parcels may be mailed if they are expected to arrive in time for Christmas. However, patrons are urged not to defer mailing until the very latest possible date but to Mail Early and prevent congestion, and give the Postal authorities opportunity to arrange for cargo space aboard ocean vessels. A great influx of mail reaching the Base Post Office around, or after the "deadline" set would result in delivery being delayed, for not only would it accentuate the problem of handling, but of finding only a limited space is allotted the Post Office in view of the urgent storage space aboard ship because of requirements for forwarding munitions and other war supplies.

IMPRACTICAL BOMBING

Bombing Volcanoes to provoke eruptions in enemy territory is not a very promising tactic. The biggest air bombs would probably have no effect at all if dropped directly into either Japanese or Hawaiian volcanoes, or indeed into any of the volcanoes in the whole Pacific region.

So says Dr. E. S. Shepherd, Carnegie Institution of Washington, volcanologist, as reported by Science Service.

Only one type of volcano might conceivably have its outburst triggered by an outside explosion. That is one in which the lava column rises close to the very rim

and eight physicians, three of whom are on a part time basis, are under the supervision of Dr. J. R. The hospital also boasts a fully

equipped laboratory for the making of tests and the preparation of medicines. There is also a specially equipped room for the treatment of eye conditions.
