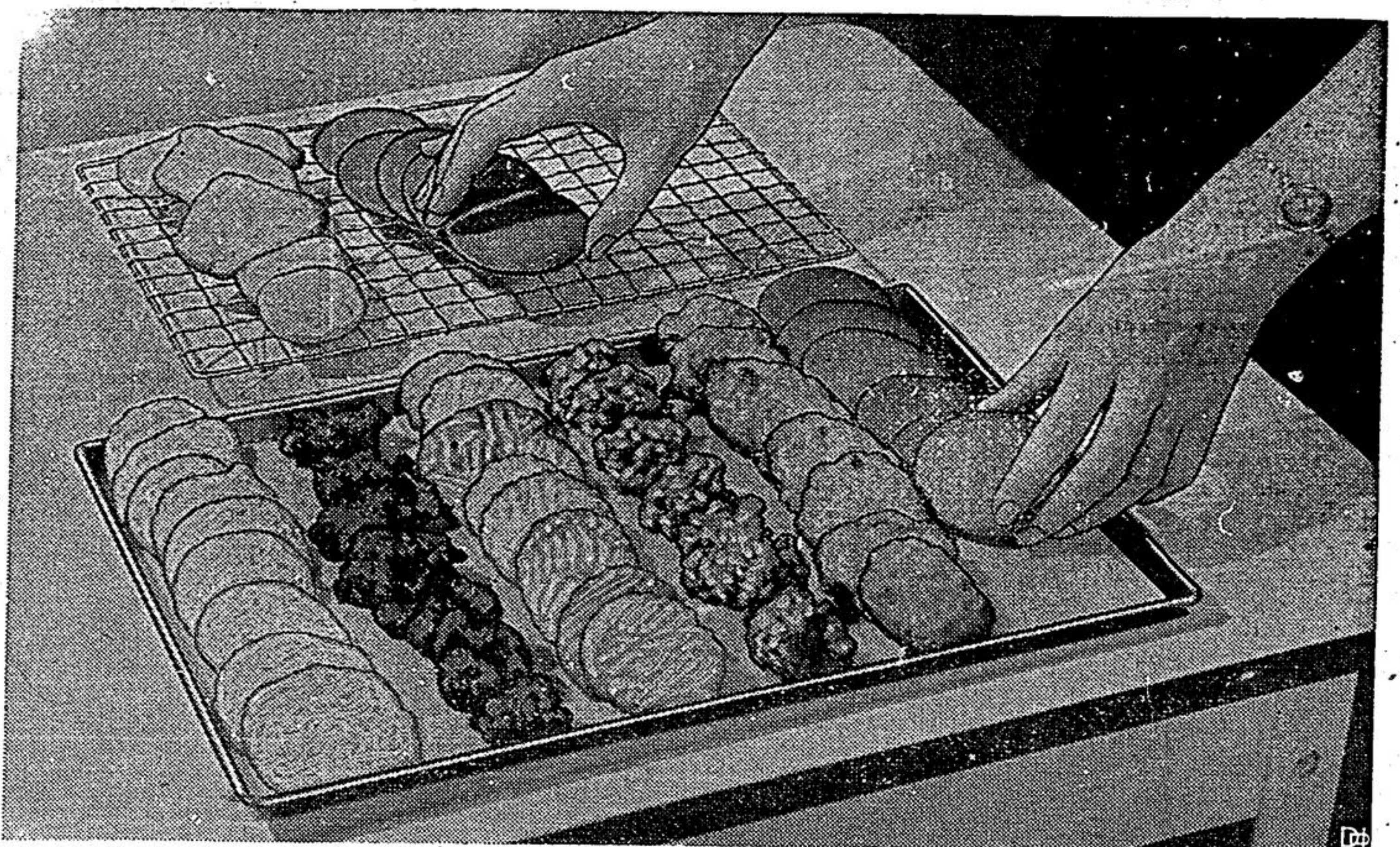

Many Delicious Cookies Can be Made Within Sugar Ration



This is no pre-war picture! It shows a delicious variety of cookies which may be made under the sugar ration and without putting any undue strain on the family allowance. Considerable experimental work has been done in Canada's Kitchen in the Consumer Section, Dominion Dept. of Agriculture, to develop new

recipes and adapt others to wartime conditions. Here is a recipe for honey wafers which requires no sugar: 2 cups honey, 1-3 cup shortening, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1 tablespoon grated lemon rind, 1 egg, 4 1/2 cups pastry OR 4-4 1-3 cups all-purpose flour, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon baking soda. Melt honey over a low heat, being careful that it does not boil. Add the shortening, lemon juice and rind and cool. Add the slightly beaten egg and lastly the sifted, measured dry ingredients. Drop by half-teaspoonfuls onto a greased baking sheet and bake at 375 degrees 10-12 minutes. Yield 8-9 dozen cookies. Accurate measurements and careful attention to the directions for mixing and baking are all important for satisfactory results in wartime recipes many of which can be obtained by writing to the. Publicity and Extension Division, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

Churches Early Pastor Dead

Forty years in the ministry, Rev. William Brown died at his home in Clarksburg last week in his 70th year. He was the Mennonite pastor in Stouffville from 1906 to 1909, succeeding Rev. R. Eltherington who was the first pastor of the church here.

Mr. Brown was born near Orangeville, and began his preaching career in the M.B.C. church. Only recently he conducted evangelistic services in Huron and Bruce counties. He is survived by his wife, formerly Ida Troxwell of Kitchener. Three sons are Rev. Cecil Brown, Toronto; Elmore of Stayner, and Irvine of Toronto. Mr. Brown was an uncle of Rev. H. Shantz of Markham.
