



Straight Furrow no Ald to Soil Conservation, Members Royal Canadian Institute are Told.

Scientific soil conservation has doubled and sometimes even tripled farm crop yields, thus aiding the war effort, H.H. Bennett, chief of the soil conservation service. United States department of agriculture; declared in Toronto Saturday night. when he spoke to the Royal Canadian Institute in Convocation Hall.

"The United States and Canada have produced the greatest crops in history to feed their armed forces, civilian workers and Allies in all parts of the world," Mr. Bennett declared.

"In the past we have been wasting our most vital assets," he declared. "Billions of tons of productive soil have been washed down rivers. It can never be reclaimed


