Holstein Men Bid \$14,000 for Bull

But Coveted Yearling Sire Sold for \$14,100 to a Chicago

An association of York County Holstein men set out to buy the coveted yearling bull Montvic Renown which sold on Saturday for \$14,100, at the dispersal sale of the G. M. Clemons herd at Brantford.

York County Holstein men through G. W. Henry bid the animal to \$14,000, then dropped from the contest, when the buyer for Curtis Candy Co., of Chicago, promptly increased the \$14,000 bid by \$100, and was the declared buyer.

Lloyd Turner, and many other Holstein men from Stouffville district, atttended the sale. Mr. Turner would have had a share in the famous bull had he been secured for York County.

Seldom has there ever been so many bidders trying to purchase a top bull at an auction. There were no less than four in the competition at \$13,000 and over. They were George W. Henry, for the York County Holstein Club; Mrs. B. M. Hallward of North Hatley, Quebec; F. C. Whitney and Henry W. Samson, of New York State, and the successful buyer, the Curtis Candy Company of Chicago.

Indicative of the value placed on Renown was the fact that five baby calves, the oldest three months brought \$2,450.

SAVE YOUR FATS

Ottawa, December 8th-A Dominion-wide campaign for the collection of fats and bones has been launched by the National Salvage Division of the Department of National War Services, in co-operatration of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board, it is announced by Charles LaFerle, Director National Salvage.

In connection with this new war drive. Mrs. Phyllis Turner, Oils and Fats Administrator, declared that today Canada faces a serious shortage of fats and oils for war industries, and needs a minimum through salvaged, fats and bones, 35,000,000 pounds of fat a year, or, reduced to per capita figures, about one ounce of fat per person per week.

This is not just another brief campaign, with a spurt to be put on for a few days or weeks and then dropped, the Salvage Director emphasizes. The campaign must be sustained, right across Canada, in every household, hotel and restaurant from day to day for the duration of the war.

Housewives are the key people in this collection. They are asked to take waste fats and bones to their meat dealer.

In any community where a dealer. In any community where a fats and bones collection system is already in operation, either through municipal collection or sponsored by a local voluntary salvage committee; housewives can continue to dispose of fats and bones through such a system.

The Canadian meat dealers, as their contribution, have undertaken to accept salvaged fats and bones at their stores, and to see that they are forwarded to the renderers and meat packers for the recovery of vital glycerine for explosives and other materials essential for war industries. Renderers and packers likewise have promised their co-operation in making the campaign a






