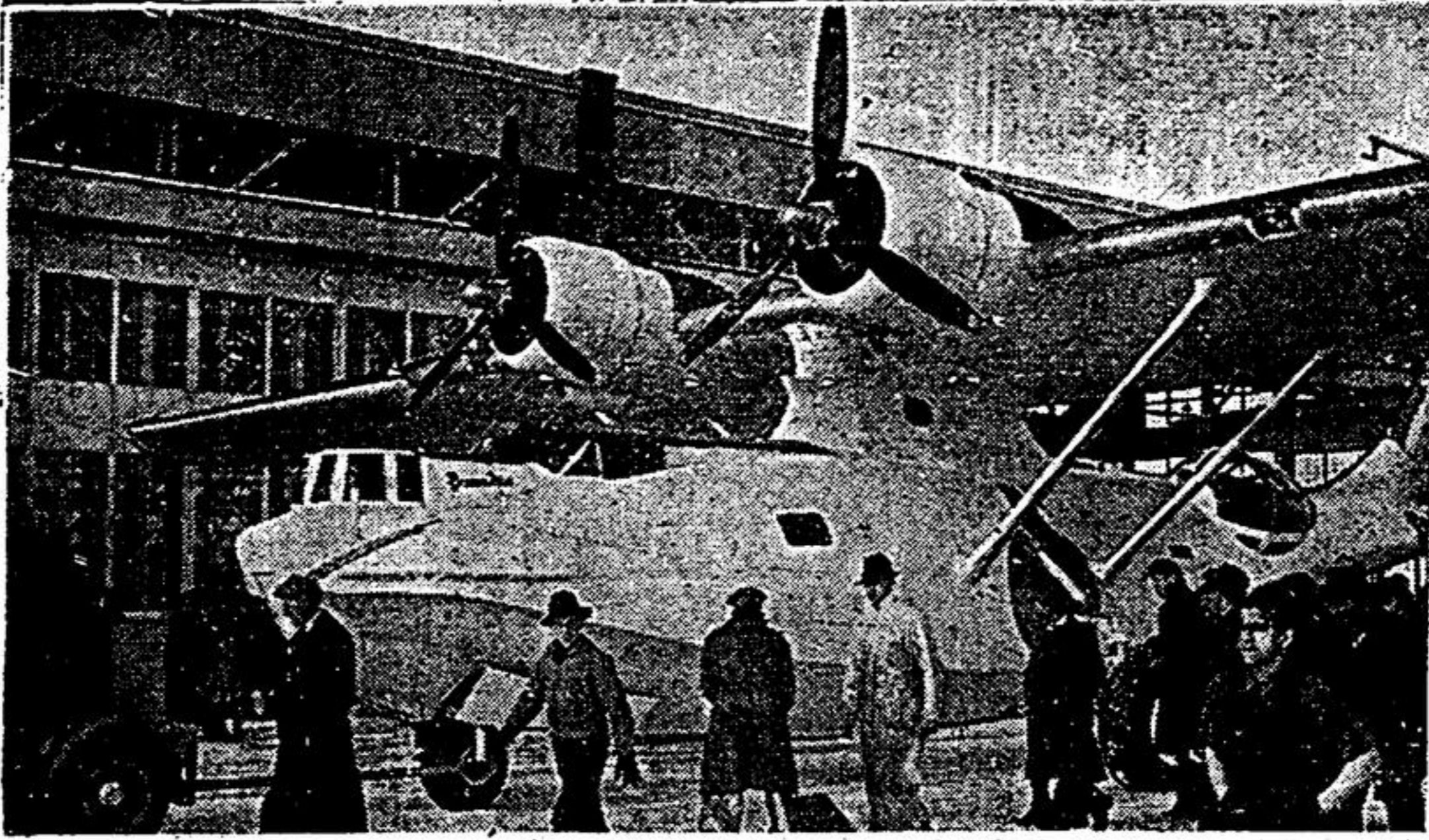
## RECALLS COMING OF THE RAILWAY

(Continued from front page) occupied by Mrs. Ben. Bartholomew's millinery store and Mr. John Bray's tailor shop. Where Schell's butcher shop stands was a frame house, back of which was Wheeler's pond. Up Mill street where Mr. Goudie now lives was a small frame house, where Charles Flint, now Chancellor Flint, was born. There was a tannery, operated I believe by a Mr. Demill, where J. Silverthorn has his garage. A spur of the railway crossed Main street here to get to the Wheeler's Grist Mill and saw mill, and where Dr. Freel lives was a cottage, with a cellar kitchen, which was the Wheeler home. From that was to the railway crossing was an orchard, with a high board fence along the Main street, later this was sold in lots. Next the hotel, where the block of stores stand now, was Mr. John Hopkin's private house and store, then a blacksmith shop and carriage shop, and no houses beyond this for some time.

Going back to the East End, on the south east corner of the school lane near the fence was the home of Mr. and Mrs. Fockler, then a small house in which the Widow Smith lived, next came a large brick building where the Post Office was, before it was moved down to Sanders' block. Mr. Archie Leaney kept store there, then came the Baptist Church and a house occupied by Mr. and Mrs. John Kent. Where Miss Sadie Stewart lives was Mr. John B. Flint's residence and then Mr. McMurchy's tannery, and Miss Annie Brownlee's row of small houses. The location of Dr. Wilson's residence used to be a store and dwelling, lived in by Jameson Grahams, then Booker's store, where we purchased our first cooking stove. To the west of this was John Allens, watch maker. The corner where Mr. F. L. Button's residence stands, was a frame building occupied by Mr. T. G. Dougall, the town constable, joining this was a drug store, operated by Dr. Rowan and upstairs was a photograph gal-

lery, conducted by John Booth. On the opposite corner was Dougherty's hardware store, then a small china store, in charge of a bachelor by the name of S. V. Bray. As a small girl, I can remember reading his advertisement, which read, "S. V. Bray wants a wife right away". His adv. paid as he later got a wife.

Mr. Les. Rowbotham's store was tenanted by William's tailor shop, and his home was James Dougherty's residence. Next came the homes of J. Bruels, Miss Kenney, and Dr. Leverage. Where Ratcliff's store now stands was a house occupied by Mr. and Mrs. James Hand and which was later moved up Mill street. Where our Post Office is now was Wheeler's mill, and back of this down in the flats was a saw mill, also a small house, where Mr. and Mrs. Dave Henderson and family lived, they were colored people and he was the foreman at Wheeler's mill. From the mill along where O'Brien Ave. is now was a large barn and yard, the property of Wheeler's. Then came the home of Mr. and Mrs. McCallum, who kept a millinery and fancy goods store. Miss McCallum now lives in this home, where Miss Daley lives was Mr. Tom Shaw's. On the corner, where Mr. Penock lives stood the frame house, which now stands across the street. At one time this building was a carriage shop and printing office, the name of the newspaper being called "The Alert." Where Mr. Quantz used to live was a frame house, where Mrs. Barkey lived and next door was the Musselman home, lived in now by Mrs. Helmkey. My father bought this home and we lived there a number of years, a sister and brother being born there, also my sister and I were married from that home. Where Mr. Holden's residence is, was our orchard until it was sold to Mr. Joe. Todd, who built the brick residence on the corner. The Gibney home was where Miss Addie Atkinson lives and Mr. J. B. Moore, the Baptist minister lived where the Wideman home is now. On the corner was the marble shop and along about where the late Mrs. Latchford lived was a barn and a very small frame house. There was vacant pro-
