He locked the door of room 242 in Osgoode Hall, Toronto, had his few remaining personal belongings removed, chuckled as he remembered the pleasant years spent in that room and paid a simple tribute to his profession. "She has been a pleasant task-mistress," said Mr. Justice Middleton, who will be 83 in March. "My memories are the kindest. The men I have worked with have on the whole been good and kindly men."

AIR CADETS MAY HAVE GLIDER TRAINING

According to word from Ottawa, Canadian Air Cadets such as those organized in Stouffville may get glider flying training this summer, if gliders can be obtained and if proposals now under consideration meet with official approval.

Gilding is considered an excellent means of sorting out persons who are potential flyers from those who can never be flyers, before they enter flying training schools.

Group Capt. D.C.M. Hume, national director of the Air Cadet League, has been investigating the possibility of getting gliders for the cadets and has in mind plans for glider work during the coming summer.

Gilding has been used in the training of British Air Cadets and Germany led the world in glider training, using it to interest many of the men now serving in the Luftwaffe in flying while they were still too young for actual flying training.
