VINELAND READER RECALLS 8th MARKHAM CLOSED ALL ONE WINTER

In writing from Vineland to this paper Mr. D. F. Byer who is still a comparatively young man, says the pictures in The Tribune showing the high snow banks recalls to him the days of his boyhood in the nineties. He recalls one winter when the 8th concession of Markham was closed for the winter and folks had to wind their way through fields wherever a way could be found that was passable. Mr. Byer says this is quite a contrast to present mode of travelling and methods to keep roads open.

TO CONSIDER FARMERS IF WORK VITAL

Farmers coming under the jurisdiction of War Services Board for Division "B," which takes in practically all of military District No.2, receive 100 per cent consideration under the plan to return them to farm work, said Reeve R. W. Scott, of Vaughan Township.

Mr. Scott, who is agriculture representative on the War Services Board, was replying to criticisms directed at the Federal Government that farmers are being forced into the army without consideration for increasing the nation's food supply. "Without exception, where a man has consistently been a farmer he gets postponement from this board," declared Mr. Scott. "This applies in any case where carefully gathered information shows that there is sufficient production to warrant him being returned to the farm."

Mr. Scott added that fairness of the actions of his board was proven in that where there was not enough information to substantiate a man's request for deferment, such deferment was refused.

"We check what they were doing at the date of registration and then determine by various sources of information to find out if between registration and being called up they have been engaged in other occupations," said Mr. Scott when asked regarding cases of evasion. "If they have been employed in industry outside of permissible seasonal occupations, no deferment is granted." He pointed out that if it is definitely proved that a man has been on the farm since March 23, 1942, he receives favorable consideration, otherwise the only chance of obtaining postponement is on the ground of harvesting perishable seasonal crops.
