TRAIN TOSSES TRUCK INTO FIELD

Murray Smith, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Amos Smith, Mt. Albert, and nephew of Everton and Arthur Smith, and George Hammett, Mt. Albert miller, were seriously injured in a level crossing crash on the C.N.R. main line at Mount Albert last Thursday. Hammett's truck, with Smith driving, was struck by a fast southbound flyer and tossed into a nearby field.

The crash occurred on the 8th concession half a mile south of the station. There are no wig-wags at the crossing, police said.

C.N.R. officials said the Continental Limited from Winnipeg gave the proper signal. The train arrived in Toronto at 11.10 a.m., four hours late.

"I could plainly see the passenger train was going to hit the truck," declared Bert Green. "I was driving east and the truck appeared to me to be going north. I heard the whistle blowing and I'm sure the train brakes were applied. The last cars of the train were still on the crossing when it came to a stop. The rear of the truck seemed to take the full force of the collision.
