Mr. A. S. Stouffer is going out of the milk business, has rented part of 100 acres to his neighbor Mr. Forsyth, and will do a bit of ranching on his own account. Unless the weather man keeps them away, there will be a good crowd at this sale to witness and take part in buying the stock and implements from this place, the first farm to be settled in this district so many years ago.

SUGAR SUPPLY FOR HOME CANNING

Regulations Are Explained By Wartime Prices and Trade Board.

Although extra sugar is again to be made available for home canning and preserving during the official canning season extending from June 1 to October 31 next, there is to be no relaxation of the regulation of last year forbidding it to those who desire to put up tomatoes, marrow and pumpkin. When the ration administration of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board speaks of "fruit" in connection with home canning operations for which it is willing to supply additional sugar it means "any fresh perishable fruit" available during the official canning season and it makes an exception only of citron. Marrow, tomatoes and pumpkin will be however, out unless any sugar required for preserving them comes from the regular rations.

Incidentally the allowance of extra sugar for canning is not to exceed one-half pound for each pound of fruit, and for making jam or jelly three-quarters of a pound for each pound of fruit. The Board would prefer people to do canning instead of making jam or jelly, because the former process saves sugar and fruit properly canned is held by nutritionists to retain more of its vitamins.

With a view to encouraging home canning, the glass factories of Canada are this year making more quart sealers so that sufficient may be available for a reasonable requirements. Metal rings will also be available for reasonable re- hoped, enough rubber for the rings fitting screw-top and spring-top jars. In addition, tin-cans will be forthcoming for the use of people who desire to can fruit for their own use, while the Oil Controller, it is reported, is endeavoring to make pro-paraffin wax to cover jams and jellies. Wherever possible, however, housewives are urged to make use of whatever canning supplies are already available to them rather than to buy new goods that may not be really needed.

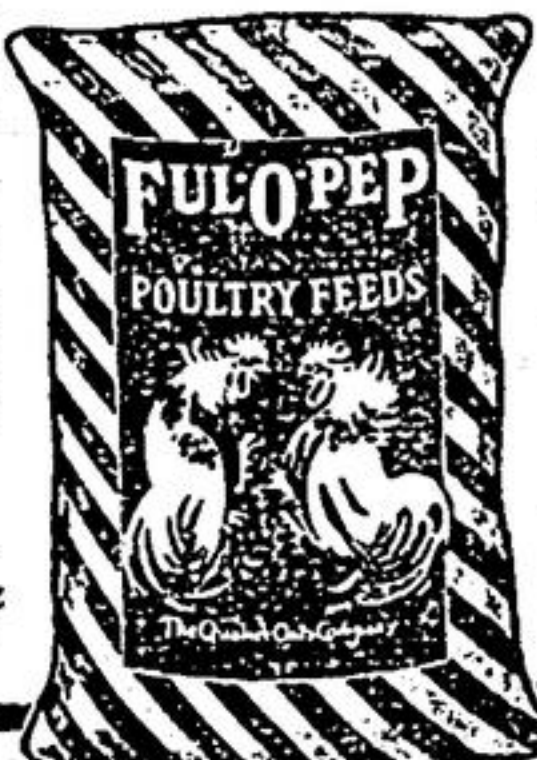
