If you live away east of Stouffville, then Lloyd Johnston, Brougham is the secretary of the Board for that area. North Whitechurch and West Whitechurch may find it more convenient to make their application to the Board at Aurora, but many Whitechurch applications are coming into Stouffville, and that is quite all right, if it suits the applicant's convenience.
