## C.N.R. Cattle Sale Total \$60,760

A total of 141 purebred Holstein-Friesian cattle, part of the big C.P.R. herd at Strathmore, Alta., realized \$60,760, at the two-day auction conducted on the Markham Fair Grounds Monday and Tuesday this week.

Fred Baston of Goodwood bought two choice heifers, but the bulk of the animals and the top priced ones went to the U.S.A. Cattlemen from every province crowded the huge tent erected for the sale. The animals were placed on a platform where all could see and inspect their fine qualities. L. E. Franklin, noted auctioneer, and several outstanding auction men from across the line were assisting in the ring. Clarke Prentice of Milliken, was also accorded a place with the blue blood salemen taking bids at the fancy prices. J. A. Suten of Vasalia, Cal., was the largest individual buyer, purchasing 17 head at an average of \$406.50. Among them were Strathmore Coleen Governors for \$625, and Ruth for \$600.
