Mr. and Mrs. D. McCullough of Claremont called on Mrs. A. B. Matthews one day last week.

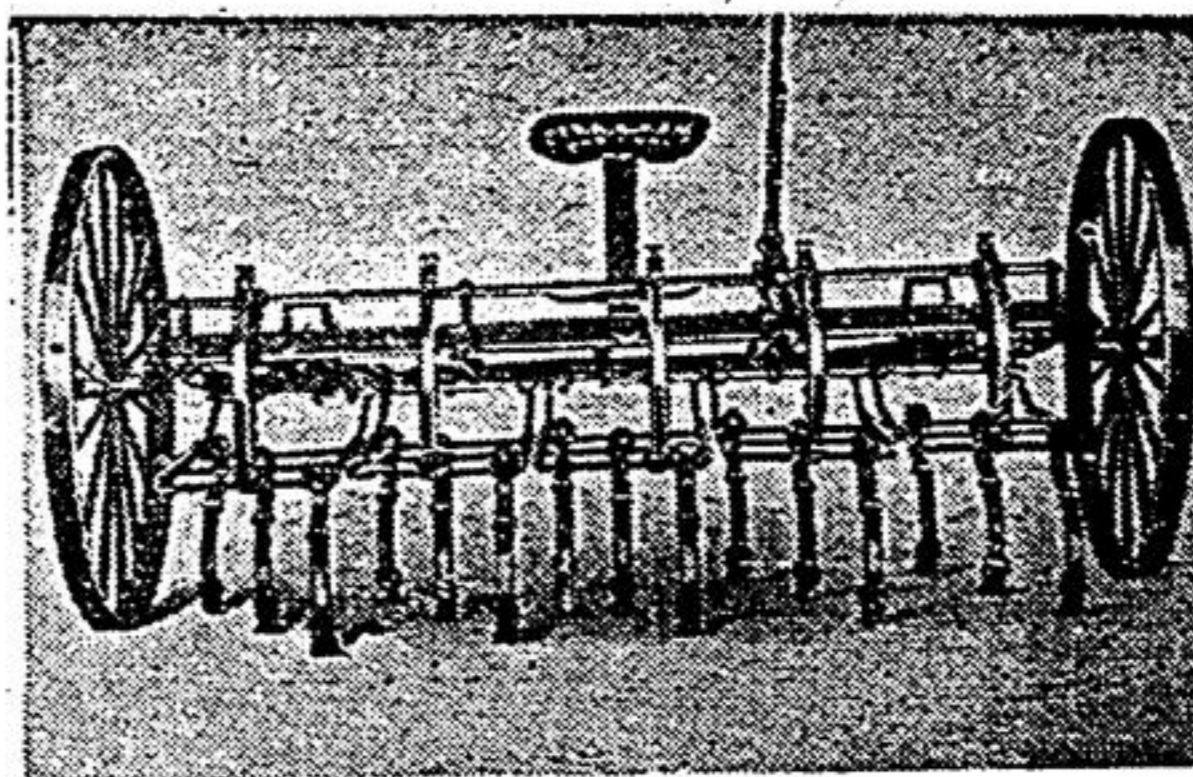

The divisional winners in Group A will get a royal welcome in Toronto where they are scheduled to go on sight-seeing tours, to the top of the empire's highest building and to air force, army and navy training depots.

Students and members of the armed forces will doubtless be present in Simpson's Arcadian Court on Saturday, May 1st to watch the "Victory Quiz Kids" do their stuff, an official explained.

In addition to the 15 prepared questions and answers used in schools a list of 75 special surprise

questions and answers is being mailed to inspectors and Victory Loan officials for use in contests.

Some of the prepared questions included in the booklet are such as the following: "How are wars paid for. What is the objective of the Fourth Victory Loan and how much is it in excess of the objective of the Third Victory Loan? Name the airplanes used by our airmen who saved the world in 1940 in the Battle of Britain and what is the average cost of a fighter plane?"

There are other questions dealing with types of weapons which bonds of various denominations will buy, the kind of country Canada should become, rates of interest on Victory bonds, and advantages in buying them, their importance as insurance against spiral of inflation, etc.
