BEE ORGANIZED PLANTED NEARLY 6,000 SAPLINGS

Nearly six thousand trees, red pine and spruce, were planted on the Reservoir property supplying water to the village of Stouffville. The feat was accomplished Wednesday afternoon by some 15 men, organized by Reeve A. E. Weldon.

The reforestation covers the five acres of recently purchased property to the north of the reservoirs, and is intended to further preserve the water supply and prevent drainage from approaching the reservoirs from adjacent fields.
