POTATO CONTROL

Through its central potato control, the Wartime Prices and Trade Board has undertaken to see that Canada's few remaining "spuds" are distributed as equitably as possible among the population.

The Board now has the right to divert potatoes from any one district to another or from one use to another if it considers this necessary. Potatoes diverted in this fashion have already been received in areas of extremely short supply.

Slaughtering

Farmers who have been accustomed to having an occasional animal slaughtered for them at abattoirs or other licensed slaughter-houses as a source of meat supply for their own households may continue to do so, according to an announcement of the Foods Administration. This section was previously prohibited in the conditions governing the slaughtering of live stock for any person who is not the holder of a permit.
