Blood Donor Clinic on June 4th

The Lions Club announce a Blood Donors Clinic will be held in the former Presbyterian church, Markham, on Friday, June 4th, beginning at 10:15 a.m. It is important that all women donors visit their family doctor prior to their history sheet can be completed and a haemoglobin test taken. Stouffville donors will co-operate with Markham to make the class large enough.

Remember no fats for breakfast or dinner on the day of the clinic.

It is important that you refrain from eating anything containing fats before you give a blood donation. The following is an outline of the breakfast and dinner which may be eaten before breakfast—Eat plenty of fruit, raw or cooked, hot or cold cereal with syrup or sugar and skimmed milk or one poached egg, white bread or toast with jam or honey, tea or coffee clear or with sugar and skimmed milk. Remember no bacon, cream or butter.

Middy meal—Any clear soup, fish, cod or haddock, fresh, salted or smoked, scallops, steamed or poached vegetables, cooked or raw but not fried; fruit cooked or raw or fruit juice; white bread plain or toasted; tea or coffee, clear or with sugar and skimmed milk only. Do not use fried food preceding a blood donation.

Late Spring Presents Farm Problems

While ordinarily late sown grain does not yield satisfactorily there are a few factors that support the seeding of spring grains till well into June. Agricultural representative, W. M. Cockburn of Newmarket, points out that everything is away behind including the leaves on our trees, blossoms etc. and with perhaps better than a fifty-fifty chance of a fair crop, that such grain as well as the straw will be appreciated by the livestock next winter. He also points out that should the crop show signs of being a failure it can be cut for green feed or plowed under as a green manure and will be worth many times its cost as such. Inure against smut by treating all grain with one of the commercial dusts. Soybeans are still obtainable and the more oat hulls we are likely to have more need will there be for this

protein-rich feed for our herds and flocks. The seed should be inoculated and cultures can be obtained from the seed houses, the Ontario Agricultural College or from the Agricultural office at Newmarket.
