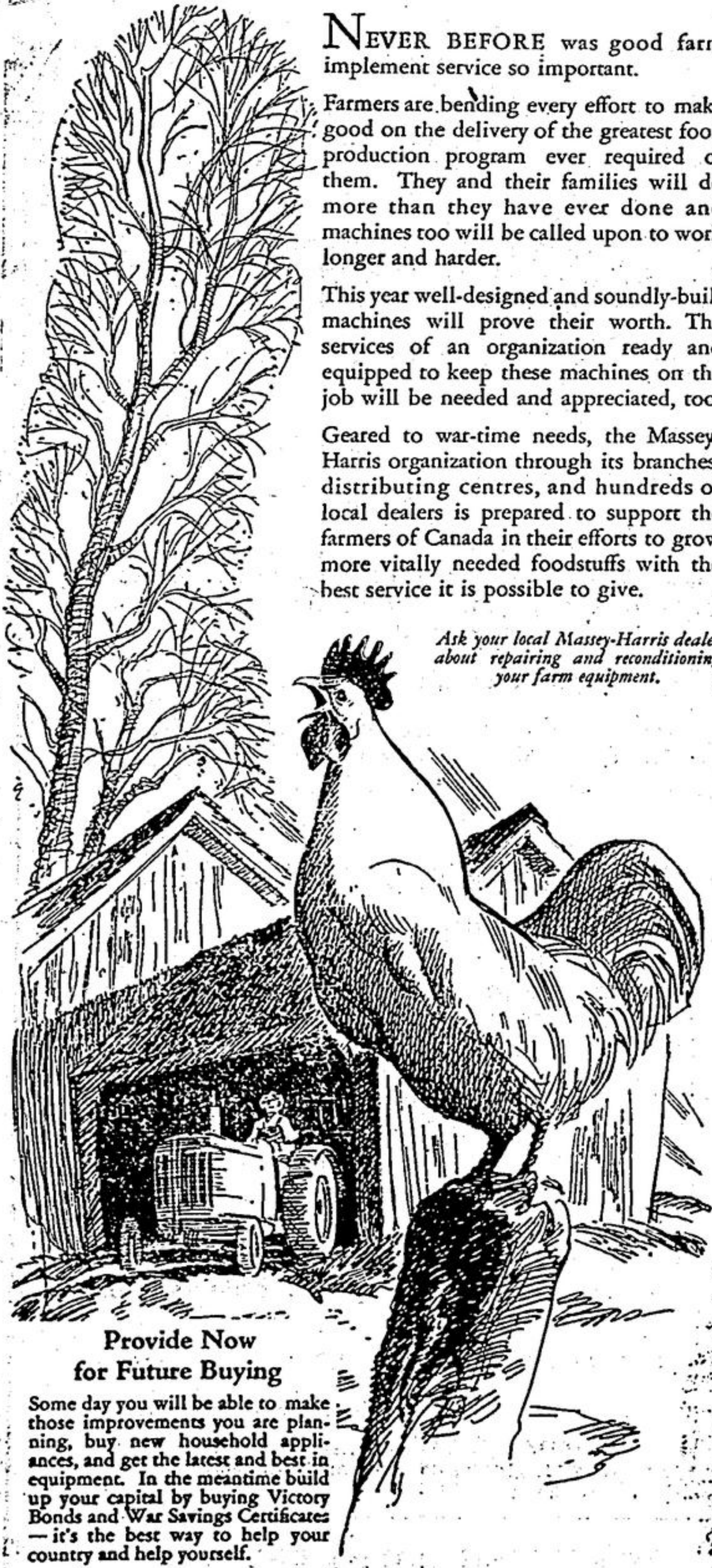

Many farmers in this district have finished seeding and if favorable weather continues this week it will after many many delays be over for this year.

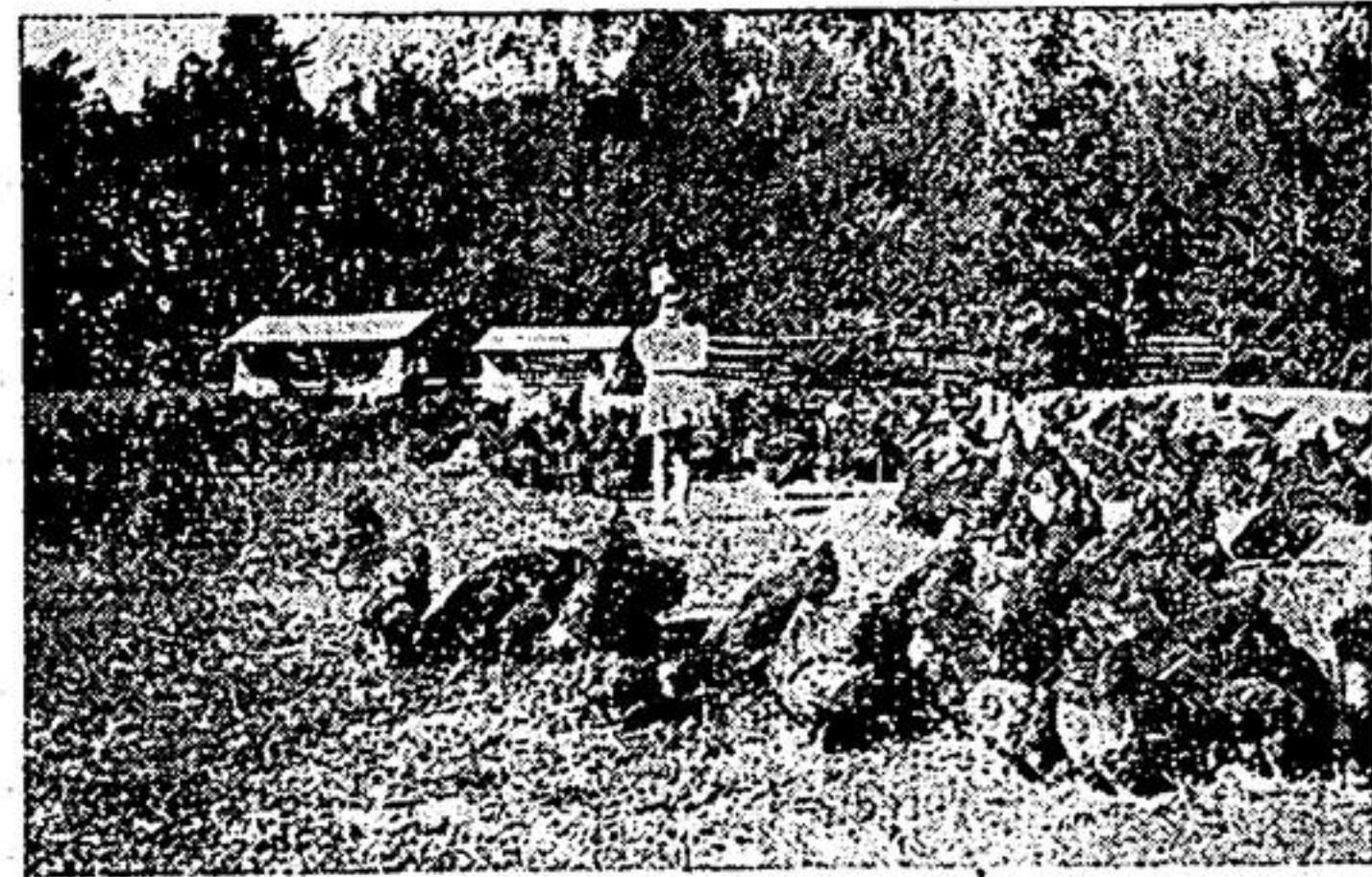
