### Markham Held Brief Council Session

Markham Township Council held a brief session on Monday afternoon, and passed the customary road budget, labor \$480, and materials, gasoline, oil and repairs to machinery for road work \$1309, of which \$660 was for gravel supplied.

George Dean asked that something be done to repair concession 11, passing his premises. Council promised to look over the road and promised some relief.

The Ontario Hydro Commission will be asked for an estimate on the cost of street lights for the Doncaster sub-division, and when obtained it will be placed before the ratepayers for consideration.

Road superintendent W. Maxwell said there is still a supply of calcium on hand for use by those farmers who are willing to put it on the road themselves if their building are close to the roadway.

The idea of supplying the dust layer without charge seems to be working well, and is generally accepted by the farmers as a good deal.

Reeve Chas. Hooper presided over Monday's session, all members being present, Deputy Reeve W. L. Clark, Councillors Albert Reesor, Reuben Stiver.

The next meeting will be in the evening on July 23rd.
