THE WEED CONTROL ACT SAYS

CLAUSE 5: Every occupant of land, or if the land is unoccupied, the owner shall destroy all weeds designed noxious by the regulations as often in every year as is sufficient to prevent the ripening of their seeds.

CLAUSE 23: Any person who contravenes any of the provisions of this Act or refuses to obey any lawful order of an Inspector given under authority of this Act, shall incur a penalty of not less than \$10.00, nor more than \$50.00 for every such offence.
