Aged Spinster Spent Lifetime in Locality Paid Subscribers Nearly Doubled in Seven Years

A very quiet unassuming woman who had lived many years in and about Stouffville, Miss Alfretha Eckardt died on Sunday at her late home in the west end of the town. While rather frail Miss Eckardt was always able to be about and cared for her own household until recently. She was 79 years of age.

Daughter of the late George Eckardt, farmer, who retired to Stouffville over 60 years ago, Miss Eckardt lived all her days here. For many years she did a great deal of sewing and was an experienced dress maker.

An only brother, Dalton, died in Winnipeg some years ago, and an only sister, Mrs. Angus McKay passed away in Toronto within recent months, hence she is the last of the family.

One niece and one nephew are the nearest relatives. It is recalled by our older residents that when the family came to town from off the farm Mr. Eckardt had built for himself the residence on O'Brien avenue now owned and occupied by Mrs. Noah Stouffer. That was 60 years ago.

The funeral on Tuesday afternoon to Stouffville cemetery followed divine service at the late home, conducted by Dr. Thos. Mitchell. Pall bearers were: Messrs. David L. Stouffer, Wesley Schell, Walter Brown, Geo. Cook, F. E. Rae and Clifford Pipher.

Tribune Has Second Largest Circulation in Both York and Ontario Counties

The latest circulation figures for The Stouffville Tribune shows that there are 1,828 paid subscribers, or about seven hundred more than there were seven years ago. This is the second largest circulation of any weekly, particularly in a town with the population of Stouffville, in both the counties of York and Ontario, being surpassed only by the Newmarket Era and Express, and the Oshawa Times, a tri-weekly.

One thousand, seven hundred and fifteen of these go to regular mail subscribers, while the other odd hundred are sold over the counter, in Stouffville, Clarendon, Goodwood and Brougham.

The Tribune, like all other weeklies is now on a newsprint quota, and subscribers, who are six months in arrears are discontinued, as there are new subscribers each week, and those in arrears must be stricken off so that we may keep within our paper allotment.

New ration books will be distributed throughout Canada between Aug. 25th and 27th, and it is expected that in Stouffville the same procedure used heretofore will be used. That is a volunteer army will be recruited to handle the business from the premises of the municipal clerk.

As far as possible the same persons who did the work last time will be sought, we understand, since they have a good knowledge of what is required.

The new books are said to contain "mystery pages" of coupons that might be used for any unforeseen rationing of some commodity in the future not rationed.

Across Canada the number of ration books that will be handed out would fill nine box cars.

THE WEED CONTROL ACT SAYS

CLAUSE 5 :
Every occupant of land, or if the land is unoccupied, the owner shall destroy all weeds designed noxious by the regulations as often in every year as is sufficient to prevent the ripening of their seeds.

CLAUSE 23 :
Any person who contravenes any of the provisions of this Act or refuses to obey any lawful order of an Inspector given under authority of this Act, shall incur a penalty of not less than \$10.00, nor more than \$50.00 for every such offence.
