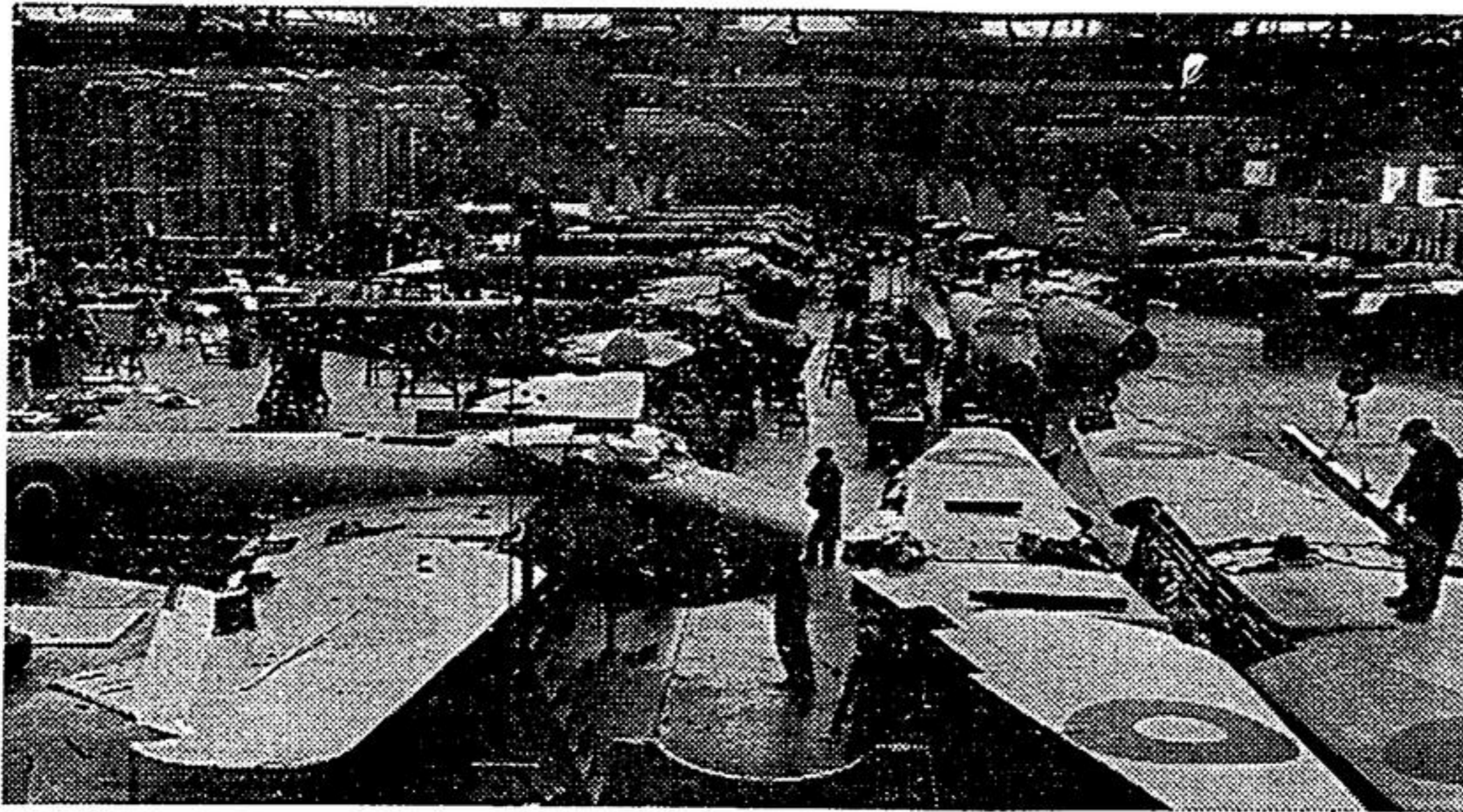

Mass Production of Mosquito Bombers



The R.A.F. Mosquito is one of the fastest aircraft in operation in the world, and has the most widely dispersed production of any aeroplane today. It is in service in several versions as a day and night bomber, a long-range day and night fighter, intruder, etc. with varying roles. The basic fighter has four 20mm.

cannon and four .303 machine guns, all mounted in the fuselage nose, giving highly concentrated fire. The basic bomber carries 200 lb. of bombs with a fuel range which brings practically the whole of Germany within its reach. The chief feature of this remarkable 'plane is the fact that it

is constructed of wood and the hull is designed in two separate halves. This facilitates ease of assembly in interior fittings before the final assembly. COMMENCES 25th YEAR AS LEADER

Chosen Liberal Chief in 1910—Believe Record without Precedent

Prime Minister Mackenzie King on Sunday began his 25th year as leader of the Liberal party amid political and international development of great significance.

So far as is known, Mr. King's own record as continuous leader of a major political party is without precedent, at least in any British country. He had been prime minister a total of about 16 years.

He was chosen leader of the Lib-

eral party Aug. 7, 1919, succeeding Sir Wilfrid Laurier, whose death that year ended a long and distinguished political career.

The prime minister has remained close to his office since parliament adjourned July 24 and has presided over two meetings of cabinet war.

51 YEARS TOWNSHIP CLERK THOS. IRWIN DEAD IN SIMCOE COUNTY

Thomas Irwin is dead. The beloved clerk of Tossoronto, Simcoe County, for over 51 years has laid aside his books and his records. He was 82 years of age. With him has gone the memory of many slates of councillors, of workers in the municipality and many deals, negotiations and adjustments of tax rates on behalf of the ratepayers of that township. For more than fifty one years Mr. Irwin kept the minutes and the correspondence of Tossoronto and with his retirement from office a few weeks ago the township lost the most faithful servant that any community of ratepayers could have been fortunate to employ. One of his most trying experiences was in the election of 1942 when his neighbour and a candidate from the south end of the township was tied for the reeveship. It fell to Mr. Irwin as returning officer to cast the vote to break the tie.

found. It lay on the dew and upon the ground. The dew is a recognized type of the refreshing influence of the Holy Spirit. The manna, as we have seen, speaks of Christ; the Bread of Life, which came down from Heaven. He came in the power of the Holy Spirit and took the lowest place as man here on earth. The people, as they came from their tents in the morning, had to trample on the manna, or gather it. So men have no other alternative than to reject Christ, or receive Him as Saviour.

Verse 15—"They said . . . It is manna: for they wist not what it was." Manna was not exactly a name to begin with. The exclamation translated "It is manna!" really means "What is it?" They had never seen its like before and could not explain it. In this the manna was like our Lord Himself, whose nature none but the Father can understand. Moses explained that the manna was the bread which the Lord had provided for their sustenance.

Verse 16—"Gather of it every man according to his eating . . . take ye every man for them which are in his tents." They were not to attempt to hoard the bread from Heaven. It had to be gathered daily, except on the Sabbath when no work was to be done. So we must feed on Christ day by day, until that final sabbath when we shall have entered into the eternal rest. There must be daily communion with our blessed Lord if we would be built up spiritually.

Verse 17, 18—"They gathered every man according to his eating." The satisfying character of the manna was one of its most striking features. If one's capacity was great, a large portion met the need. If his appetite was more easily satisfied, a lesser quantity sufficed. So it is spiritually. Christ suffices for every heart whether the degree of spiritual intelligence there may be, or whether the capacity to appreciate spiritual things be small or great.

Chap. 17:3—"The people thirsted there for water and . . . murmured against Moses." They had experienced God's care in such a remarkable way and enjoyed His daily provision for their needs. Yet when the next trial came and they found themselves in a part of the desert where there was no visible water supply, they began to complain and to find fault with Moses whom God had so signally used for their deliverance from Egypt, as though it were his fault that they were thirsting in the wilderness. It shows how feebly they had entered into the reality of God's care for them.

Verse 4—"Moses cried unto the Lord, saying: What shall I do unto this people?" In his extremity, Moses turned to the One who had never failed him yet, and upon whose pledged word he knew he could rely. The thirsty people, in their misery, had turned against him instead of humbling themselves before the Lord, so that they were "almost ready to stone" their human leader, to whom they owed so much. What would God's answer be?

Verse 5—"The Lord said . . . Go on before the people, and take . . . thy rod." With that rod wonders had been wrought in Egypt and the Red Sea. It was the symbol of the divine authority and had been exercised in judgment against the enemies of Israel. Now it was to be used to bring life and refreshment to God's people themselves.

Verse 6—"Thou shalt smite the rock, and there shall come water out of it, that the people may drink." The puerile suggestions of Christless rationalists, that Moses had detected a hidden spring, needing only to let loose by removing a portion of the stone that had choked its mouth, is unworthy of anyone making claim to honesty. Moses was no charlatan pretending to powers he did not possess. At God's command he struck the rock in Horeb; and from the cleft made thereby a stream gushed forth.

The Heart of the Lesson
He who had redeemed His people at so great a cost will ever provide for and sustain them as they pursue their pilgrim journey from "the blood of sprinkling" to the eternal rest, the inheritance laid up in Heaven for all who believe. If we allow ourselves to become panic-stricken by the perplexities we are called upon to face, it only evidences our lack of faith and in no way changes God's ability or willingness to meet our need. Though our murmurings dishonor Him, He ever proves faithful to His own word. He cannot deny Himself. The manna and the living water from the smitten rock are sufficient for every need. As we feed upon Christ and enjoy the Holy Spirit's testimony to His finished work, we find both food and drink for our spiritual natures. And as to our temporal needs, He has given His pledged word that He will supply them all not merely according to our poor apprehension, but according to the supply of His own wealth.

PRICE VIOLATIONS BRING \$25,000 FINE
Sam Cohen, Montreal clothing manufacturer has been fined a total of \$25,000 or 13 years, nine months in jail after pleading guilty to 14 charges of selling clothing above the ceiling price, failure to have his prices approved by the Price Board and other violations. In passing sentence, Judge Rene Theberge said the offence was the most despicable since Cohen is a manufacturer of cheap clothing and it was thus the poor people who were made to suffer as a result of his illegal price operations.
